Fall is here and I hope everyone had a safe and fun Halloween. A few quick updates.

The County Council's Transportation Committee has been debating various aspects of the proposed Bus Rapid Transit plan that was discussed in the last Echo. I'd expect to have a more substantive update in the next Echo once the dust settles.

The only item of note in White Flint development news is that Federal Realty will be upgrading the building that is home to Starbucks and Bank of America at Pike and Rose, which is at the corner of Rockville Pike and Old Georgetown Road. This pad site is 10-15 years from being redeveloped, so Federal Realty is upgrading the facade of the building, increasing landscaping and improving pedestrian access. They are also making room for Chipotle in the old Serenberry space. Most importantly, to me, there will be a larger outdoor seating area in front of Starbucks. Construction is scheduled to kick off this winter and be completed in Summer 2014.

A friendly reminder to send in your annual RCA membership dues or renew online. Our ability to print the Echo that you are reading right now depends on it. For those that have renewed, thank you for continuing to support the RCA!

For the December General Meeting, I have a preliminary commitment from Saul Centers to present their vision for their properties in White Flint. They will be redeveloping the McDonalds property, the Metro Pike Center, and Staples, which is across the street. The development of these properties will change the character of Rockville Pike for the better, based on the renderings I've seen. Once I can confirm that Saul Centers is presenting, I will post a message on the RCA website and Yahoo Group. Hope to see you there on December 5th at 8pm.

Lastly, I am looking forward to the annual holiday caroling outings which bring holiday cheer to our neighborhood. Please mark your calendars, for the evenings of December 2, 9, 16, 23, from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. Thank you to Christiana Drapkin for starting and continuing this wonderful RCA tradition.

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October General Meeting Minutes by Jason Ott

- 1. Call to order: 8:00 PM
- Delegate AI Carr is in attendance to learn more about our community.
 - 2. Old Business
- Concerns have been voiced about the intersection at Rocking Horse and Boiling Brook. RCA has asked for efforts to improve this intersection in the past but has not gotten far. We will contact MCDOT again to see if they might be willing to do something about this continued source of frustration. Some suggestions from residents include making it a four-way stop, painting white lines on the pavement where to stop, and marking Boiling Brook better to delineate the lanes.
- An update was provided on the Wall Park/
 Executive Boulevard Abandonment. Chad Salganik
 reported that a portion of Executive Boulevard will be
 straightened to ease traffic as part of the White Flint development. The Gables will build a mixed-use development with a garage adjacent to the Aquatic Center. The
 garage will include parking for the Aquatic Center. The
 current parking lot will be converted to Wall Park. Parks
 and Rec is soliciting feedback on how to develop this
 park.
- RCA testified in support of Bus Rapid Transit (BRT). The plans are in the initial stages. BRT is planned for Randolph Road and will share lanes with other traffic. RCA requested a stop in RCA-land so that our residents will have better access.
 - 3. New Business
- The development of White Flint is moving along. The Aurora, which is next to Harris Teeter is under construction and will begin delivering units in spring. The Gables will present a plan soon for 450 units.
- The North Bethesda Gateway filed a sketch plan amendment for Nicholson Lane and Huff Court. The amendment moves to apartments for the site.
- The Pike and Rose Phase 2 Site Plan is progressing. Part of Pike and Rose opens in Fall of 2014. A hearing will be held on Phase 2, which is the end near Le Madeleine. Phase 3 is five to ten years away.
- Saul Centers has presented a sketch plan to a community committee. This includes the building with Staples. The plan was re-designed and re-presented. It now includes two residential buildings and one office building.
- The RCA Fun Run is Saturday, October 5th, starting at 10 AM. Runners can sign up on the website.
 The run is a 5K around RCA-land. A Kids Fun Run will follow.
- The RCA Community Day Picnic will be held after the run from noon to 2 PM in the gazebo area.
- A complaint was made on the hotline about residents hanging clothes in their front yard. The county allows residents to do this.
 - · The Luxmanor Civic Association Meeting on

White Flint Development Projects will be October 10th, at 7:30 PM, at Trinity Church. Different developers will be present to share their plans.

- The Friends of White Flint has a promotion with Paladar. A donation of \$25 to Friends of White Flint will get you a \$25 for Paladar (Note: this promotion ended October 8th).
- RCA will try to get a speaker from Saul Centers to present in December. We may look at an additional speaker, as well.
- The RCA Community Yard Sale is October 12th, at Loehmann's Plaza. The Boy Scout troup is taking over managing this long-standing community event.
 - 4. Standard Business
- The Minutes from the previous meeting were approved.
- The Treasurer was absent so no report was provided.
- The Safety Committee reported that there have been some thefts from cars. There is a Neighborhood Watch list that residents can join if they would like. This group receives the police reports. If you are interested, please contact Mara Greengrass.
 - 5. The RCA meeting was adjourned at 9:15 PM.

Garrett Park Bridge is falling down, falling down, falling down



Those of you who use Garrett Park Road to get in and out of Randolph Hills may have noticed new signage approaching Garrett Park Road bridge, warning of vehicle weight limitations. These new signs have been installed because MCDOT engineers have determined that the Garrett Park Road bridge is failing and needs to be replaced. Don't worry, the bridge is not going to collapse underneath you, but MCDOT wants to make sure the bridge remains safe until they can replace it, so the fewer large vehicles the better.

Right now, the replacement project is in the planning phase, which will take about a year to complete. At that point, MCDOT will notify the surrounding communities with details.

According to one of the MCDOT engineers I spoke with, there are two likely scenarios that we may be presented with. The first would be that they close the bridge completely and replace it. This would be the fastest option, and would take about two months to complete. The second scenario would be to replace half the bridge at a time, always keeping one lane open for traffic. The downside of this would be that construction would take anywhere from twelve to eighteen months, and there would be a traffic light installed to manage the single lane traffic.

Bear in mind that these are likely scenarios, they are not certain. We won't really know what our options are until around this time next year.

Where Do We Live? Part 3 of 3: WHITE FLINT!

With this Echo issue, we continue the argument, er, conversation about the proper name for where we live – are we in Rockville? Or North Bethesda? Or White Flint?

Over the last two Echos, we've had a lively series discussing where we live. While many of us call our community "Rockville," as advocated by Mara, our county has a City of Rockville with defined borders. RCA-land isn't in there. Others call our community "North Bethesda," as advocated by Matt. This is a little closer because our neighborhoods are included in the county Planning Department's North Bethesda/Garrett Park Master Plan. But, this Master Plan also includes areas like Twinbrook, Grosvenor, the Town of Garrett Park and White Flint.

That's the problem with living in a county with so little incorporated space. Many of the names we use are manufactured because there are no defining borders. So, why use the name of a city we're not in? Why use a contrived name that piggybacks on a community five miles to our south? Might this be a time to forge our own path? What if we call ourselves White Flint?*

I know what you're thinking – White Flint is a mall, or a metro station. It's not where we live. And, you're right, sort of. The White Flint Sector Plan is spurring redevelopment throughout our area with the goal of transforming Rockville Pike and its local surrounds into a more mixeduse, walkable destination. A combination of restaurants, retail, residential, green space and other amenities has the potential for completely shifting our area. The White Flint Sector is poised to become the economic engine of our county and, therefore, our state.

Although the plan presently stops at the railroad tracks, the second phase (called White Flint II) does incorporate a chunk of Randolph Hills. So, if we're going to hop on a bandwagon, why not align ourselves with the most exciting and forward-thinking changes our county has ever undertaken?

*It is possible that, as the White Flint Sector Plan is implemented, a new name emerges to define the area. If that happens, please substitute it everywhere you see "White Flint" here.



Holiday Safety Tips from the County Police

As the holidays are quickly approaching, it is important to remember that many criminals view this time of year as an opportunity for them to ply their trade. I ask that each of you once again review the following information and use good common sense and judgment to help prevent you five new rookies from becoming the victim of a crime.

Shopping

If you are one to brave the malls during the holidays, please remember the following:

- 1. Limit the amount of cash you carry and do not readily display it when making purchases.
- 2. Place any items purchased in your locked trunk. If you cannot do this, then cover them up with a blanket to deter a break-in.
- 3. Remove all gifts and other valuables from your car immediately upon getting home. You may be exhausted but you need to bring them inside to a secured area.
- 4. Look for suspicious people in parking garages and call security or the police immediately.

If you are like me and let your fingers do the shopping on-line, you still need to take precautions:

- 1. Be sure you are shopping at reputable sites. If a deal seems too good to be true, it is probably a scam to get your credit card information.
- 2. Arrange for deliveries during times you will be home or leave instructions for the packages to be delivered to a trusted neighbor. Packages that are left unattended on front porches are an invitation to be stolen.

Vacations

Whether you are going away for a week, a weekend or just overnight, you need to make sure that your house appears to be occupied to deter burglars from choosing your home.

- 1. Place indoor and outdoor lights/televisions/radios on timers set for different times of the day and night.
- 2. Make sure mail and newspaper/mail delivery is cancelled or picked up by a neighbor on a daily basis.
- 3. Put gifts away so a burglar looking into your window will see nothing and move on to another house.
- 4. Lock your cars and remove all valuables including any garage door openers.
- 5. Lock the garage door and the door leading from the garage to the house.

Telemarketers/Solicitors

Do not fall prey to scam charities trying to take advantage of your holiday goodwill.

- 1. Ask the caller to provide you with their name, address, telephone and tax ID#, so you can call them back if you decide to make a donation.
- 2. Do not answer the door if you are not comfortable doing so. Ask the solicitor to display his license or leave literature on the porch for you to review later.
- 3. Call the police if you encounter any suspicious people in your neighborhood.

General safety

- 1. Cell phone usage during driving is now a primary offense. Please pay attention to the road.
- 2. Watch for pedestrians, especially now that we are losing daylight.
- 3. Use a designated driver or a taxi if you are celebrating with alcohol.

Thanks for continuing to work with us. We just added five new rookies to our staff and they are excited to be part of the 2nd District community.

Deer-proof Bulbs and other Spring-blub Planting Tips

Success with spring bulbs depends on soil conditions and available sun, in addition to how resistant they are to various animal pests, such as deer, rabbits, squirrels, moles/voles. Deer "proofing" sprays can be tried. Deer "candy" such as tulips can be planted in containers and placed on decks...or front porches if more than about three-plus steps.

But remember: NO plant or bulb is deer proof. If they are really hungry, deer will eat anything.

Deer resistant plants tend to smell strongly (herbs); or have a lot of hairs on the leaves (often looking silvery); or taste bad and/or are poisonous.

Suggestions for bulbs include (and these are usually widely available; the bigger the bulb the better): DAF-FODILS/NARCISUS - huge variety of colors, bloom time, height; GRAPE HYACINTH (Muscari) - shades of blue or white may have green highlights, 4-9"; SCILLA, SQUILL or STAR OF HOLLAND (Scilla siberica) - blue and white, 5-8"; SNOWDROPS (Galanthus nivalis) - Clear milk white, usually with emerald green tipped inner segments, 4-6"; WINTER ACONITE (Eranthis cilicica) - yellow, 2-4"; ALLIUM (also rodent resistant) - white, yellows, pink and purple, wide variety in sizes/shapes, most widely known have pom pom type heads on tall, straight stalks; DWARF IRIS (Iris reticulata) - white, blue, purple; may have yellow markings, 4-6"; SIBERIAN SQUILL - true-blue flower, 3-8"; CROCUS – highly vulnerable to squirrels digging up and eating or replanting someplace else; GLORY OF THE SNOW (Chinodoxa forbesii) - multiple blue, star-shaped blossoms with white centers, 4-6"; HYACINTH - rich blues to vibrant magentas and pinks to cool yellow and whites; EARLY STARDRIFT (Puschkinia libanotica) - silvery blue/ white, 6-12"; FRITILLARIA - wide variety in sizes/shapes, checkered reddish-brown, purple, white and gray, 6 - 15".

Plant most bulbs where they get at least 6 hours of full sun. Shade from deciduous trees (maples, dogwood, oaks, etc.) is usually not an issue since most spring bulbs will have finished blooming before leaves appear on the tree.

If you have a lot of tree roots, rocks, or existing plants, stick to smaller bulbs that don't have to be planted more than 2 to 4 inches deep. In turf areas, the grass can be peeled back and holes can be dug for multiple bulbs to be planted.

Bulbs can be planted in layers. Dig a trench 8-12" deep. Plant daffodils in the bottom, add some soil, and then plant some other bulbs. Repeat until "trench" is filled. It creates a nice affect with different bloom times.

Changes to Maryland traffic laws regarding cell phones and seatbelts

The following, courtesy of the Montgomery County Police Department 2d District, details new laws effective Oct. 1:

- Any driver using hands to use a handheld telephone while a motor vehicle is in motion will be committing a primary traffic offense: first offense is an \$83.00 fine, including court costs; Second offense is a \$140.00 fine; Third and subsequent offense is a \$160.00 fine. If the violation contributed to an accident, three (3) points will also be assessed in addition to the fine.
- Any driver using hands to use handheld telephone while operating a commercial motor vehicle, first offense is a \$290.00 fine and also a primary traffic offense.

The following violations are now \$83.00 fines:

- Failing to secure a child under age of 8 in a child safety seat when transporting in a motor vehicle.
- Failing to transport a child under age of 16 in (child safety seat per instructions, seatbelt).
- Using a (child safety seat, seatbelt) to (restrain, seat, position) more than one individual.
- Operating a motor vehicle with (operator, occupant under age 16) not restrained by (seatbelt, child safety seat).
- Passenger age 16 or more in outboard front seat of motor vehicle without seatbelt restraint. Example of an "outboard front seat" is a front passenger seat next to a door.

New Secondary traffic offense:

 Passenger age 16 or more in rear seat of motor vehicle without seatbelt restraint. The fine is \$83.00, including court costs.


