President's message

A Destination or a Roadside distraction?

Randolph Hills and connected subdivisions. Are we a community of more than 1300 households conveniently located on the east side of North Bethesda, distinctive for its friendly residents, mature greenery and beautiful azaleas? Or are we a bunch of brick houses you zoom past on that shortcut on your way to work? Before I moved here, it was definitely the second. And you can see many people with the same idea driving by every morning. Our identity will probably never be real important to anyone but residents, but the attitude of our present residents can definitely have an effect on our future ones. Understanding the majority attitude is the ongoing challenge for your civic association.

Case in point. We had a County traffic light expert at our General Meeting last week. He talked about the central control facility, the mechanics of traffic signals and how the County tries to do its best in controlling an ever-increasing number of cars on the road. He said projections are for traffic to double in 10 years. Yikes! It led to a discussion about traffic through our neighborhood and a discussion on whether we should be trying to ease it through or slow it down. The slower-downer's reason that extra turn lanes and right-turn-no-stop-signs merely make RCA-land a more attractive shortcut for commuters. The ease-it-throughers felt like we all benefit from an efficient system. Who's right?

We all know that Rocking Horse to Boiling Brook is usually faster than Randolph, through the lights around Loehmann's. But if you lived on Rocking Horse, would you let your kids play in the front yard? Have you ever tried to walk across Boiling Brook during rush hour?

Do we want the County to think of our neighborhood as a shortcut? What about all the other shortcut neighborhoods that have speed bumps and a stop sign on every block? Do we want that? Does it matter what we want?

Yes. That is the ultimate answer. We can influence the County. It's tiring and difficult. It's political. It takes forever. But the squeaky wheel does get the grease. The really hard part is getting consensus from our members. As stated above, different people have different opinions.

But if we think about our neighborhood as the community described in the first paragraph and if we act to protect that image, soon the people zooming past will wish they lived here instead of just passing through. Join us at a meeting this spring and get an attitude.

Minutes of the RCA March General Meeting

President Jack Stillwell opened the meeting late, just as our guest speaker entered the door. Bill Corder is the manager of the Traffic Management Center, Department of Public Works and Transportation. Bill said 30 years ago when he started, there were only 200 stoplights in the County, and now there are 750! All of Montgomery's stoplights are networked, so the Center can adjust the red to green timing. The Center has many responsibilities, including Ride-on Bus scheduling, traffic cameras (but not the County's 10 red-light cameras), and even traffic monitoring from a light plane! Bill said there are not enough new roads being built, so better traffic management is more important than ever. He discussed how the camera information is shared with the 911 center, news stations, and Virginia. He gave out their website, and said on snow days it receives over 1/2 million "hits."

The RCA President emphasized our main concern: the intersection at Rockinghorse and Boiling Brook. We strongly believe a stoplight is desperately needed. Bill said he is open to the idea, understood our stoplight suggestion has been studied before, and opened the floor to questions. In one response, he said that yes, Los Angeles has the worst traffic in the nation, but it is "just slightly ahead of DC"! Bill does not see any one way out of bad traffic, and thinks people will begin using public transportation only when they cannot take driving anymore. He answered questions on street lighting, overfilled bus stop trash cans, and the way commuters cheat the Boiling

Brook/Nicholson intersection by looping through the Texaco. Bill spoke for 55 minutes, and was given a round of applause as he left.

RCA President Stillwell noted that Chana Solomon Schwartz, Student President of the Charles E. Smith School, was present at our meeting, and welcomed her. Mr. Stillwell then turned to the meeting agenda, and RCA'ers, in a notably calm and relaxed way, discussed and voted on various agenda items. Traffic, especially on our local roads of Rockinghorse and Boiling Brook, remain a primary RCA concern.

The RCA Secretary proposed RCA by-laws revisions, listed in February's *Echo*. However, the motion got bogged down on the precise wording, so the President suggested tabling the issue. Instead **Withdrawn:** the motion to revise the RCA by-laws.

Next the Secretary referred to February's *Echo* article regarding "Development Impact Tax," and what he

would testify to before the County Council. He suggested that the development tax on new upcounty townhouses and apartments should cover not only needed roads but also all services required. Passed by unanimous voice vote: that the new tax on upcounty [only] housing developments cover more than just transportation, but also include the total cost of bringing basic services to these new **Montgomery County resi**dents (e.g.: schools; fire stations; libraries; and roads).

The Secretary proposed the RCA support a two-percent increase to our State "Piggy-back" tax. This is the County's portion of the MD state income tax. Many RCA-ers were opposed to this tax increase, and no formal vote was taken.

Passed by unanimous vote-vote: to work to get all of RCA-land represented by the same State legislative district. Presently RCA'ers north of Randolph Road are represented by District 18 (most of which is on Veirs Mill Road), and RCA'ers south of Randolph are represented by District 17. Using Randolph Road as a dividing line may look reasonable when using a map, but only serves to dilute RCA-land political power.

A suggestion to give out RCA "parking tickets" to cars that block RCA sidewalks was discussed and rejected. Instead, our objection to blocking public sidewalks, which is illegal, will be emphasized in this newsletter.

The RCA will Adopt-a-Road, Randolph, and apply for a sign with RCA's name on it. Several zoning issues, including blueprints of the White Flint Conference Center, and the new Home Depot were reviewed and discussed.



Scouts? Do RCA dues go to the boys' organizations? If so, caller has a problem with that because the Boy Scouts do not take everyone - they discriminate. Also, what about the (proposed) Montrose Parkway? Does the RCA have a position on this? [Ans: The RCA encourages participation by all its members. The reason there are no articles regarding girls' activities is that no one submits them. The RCA has, on several notices in the Echo, promised funding for any organized group that supports girls. So far, no takers. There used to be a 4-H group organized in RCA that did submit articles for the Echo. The RCA supports the Boy Scouts with an annual donation of about \$400, and \$120 per issue of the Echo for its delivery. Zoning News

Nearby Building Construction Begins

"White Flint Place" is a new development now being constructed where Serios used to be, at the NE corner of Rockville Pike and Old Georgetown Road. The site complies with permissible zoning, meaning it will be huge and we cannot do anything about it! Commercial offices and stores will fill 259,430 sq. ft. and residential condos will be 493,326 sq. ft! Building #1 will be on the Pike, with offices and retail space (a restaurant, health club, and stores). Buildings #2 and #3 will be 500-525 residential condos. There will two matching plaza entryways, cul-de-sacs facing Old Georgetown Road. The second entryway will be a pickup/drop-off for the two condo buildings. An underground garage will have access from a small service road abutting the new Jefferson Villas apartments next door. The RCA reviewed the design plan and it looks nice. Our concern is that we will be buried in gridlock traffic once this project, the new White Flint Conference Center & Hotel, and all the other projects in the pipeline are complete.

Nearby Road Construction Planned

State Highway Planners presented to the county Planning Board proposals for rebuilding the intersections at Randolph Road and the railroad tracks, and Rockville Pike & Montrose Road. These two intersections will be rebuilt as one big project, with three different alternatives considered.

Two of the alternatives have Randolph Road going underneath Rockville Pike, so that drivers and pedestrians do not have to cross Pike traffic. The third plan simply expands the present at-grade intersection, so that 18-lane roads converge at a massive intersection! This 18-lane road plan (nine in each direction) is seriously considered because it is the cheapest, at \$60 million. The other two options would each cost \$73-80 million.

Nebel will be extended, so that it runs from Nicholson Lane, through the Randolph Rd intersection, with a new part along the railroad tracks, ending at Bou Avenue, past the Montrose Crossing (Giant) Shopping Center.

One new problem is the Montrose Parkway: how will it tie in with these plans? The Montrose Parkway is a controversial county highway (above are state plans) that will run from I-270 to Veirs Mill Rd. This Parkway is in the 1992 North Bethesda/Garrett Park Master Plan, and it is being designed now, but the County Council has not funded it.

Special Exemption and Waivers

RCA Execs are increasingly concerned about the County Planning Board issuing waivers or special exemptions to zoning regulations. RCA-land is described as "single-family detached homes." Since the 1950's, RCA-land homes were designed and built for nuclear families (mother, father, children) to live side-by-side. The Randolph Civic Association exists, according to our by-laws, to maintain this way of life. We understand group homes for troubled teens, the elderly, and the poor are needed, but Not In My Back Yard (NIMBY).

The RCA Execs mention this now because as our area becomes increasingly urban, more pressure will mount to insert "facilities" in our neighborhood. For example, the neighborhood civics along Old Georgetown Road continually fight to stop all manner of good and needed facilities from being built next door to them (doctor's offices, clinics).

Aspen Hill is fighting off a \$10 million, low-income, 180-apartment complex, including 30 assisted-living units, from being built in their area by a non-profit group (Victory Housing). This project was originally planned for a 12-acre site in Hampshire Village, but neighbors protested. So it was then proposed for a 7-acre site in Aspen Hill. County Executive Duncan said, "It is crucial this project be moved forward and constructed in a timely fashion." Aspen Hill civics assert the planned site is way too small for that many apartments. If "past is prologue" we can expect Aspen Hill to run this project out of their area, and into a neighborhood near you.



Gardening Tips

The History of RCA-land

uring the US Civil War, your house was located near the seat of the Federal Government, and just across the Potomac from the Confederacy. This led to an early occupation by Federal Troops. Rockville was the County seat, and had a population of only 500.

Last time we reported that in June 1861, Federal troops began camping in RCA-land. We continue with daily Civil War reports of actual events.

Friday, July 19, 1861: James Henning, the Clerk of the Circuit Court, offered a \$200 reward for information on the attempt to burn down his house two weeks ago. Little damage was done, but Henning, an outspoken Unionist, has hosted several meetings at his house for the Union Cause.

Wednesday, August 14, 1861: There have been reports that soldiers encamped near Watt's Branch have been enticing the Negroes of local residents to run off. Several soldiers from the New York 2nd actually entered Mrs. Wotton's kitchen and persuaded her slave man and woman to come to their camp, promising them protection. She had to send her son to the camp to bring a captain back and compel the soldiers to leave. Colonel Gorman, Commander of the brigade at Seneca Mills, attempted to ease the concerns of local slave-owners by issuing orders that all slaves of Maryland residents and the District of Columbia are prohibited from his camp.

Wednesday, October 9, 1861: Today it was reported that Levin Hoskinson, an apprentice at the Sentinel newspaper, had been killed at the Battle of Bull Run the previous July. Levin was the first Rockville boy to die in the Civil War. Eli Moulden enlisted with Levin into the 7th Virginia Infantry the previous May. Eli was severely wounded in the same engagement, and taken to a Confederate field hospital.

Baked Shrimp and Asparagus



- 1 12 oz. pkg frozen cut asparagus
- 1 lb. medium shrimp, peeled & deveined
- 1 10 3/4 oz. can condensed cream of shrimp soup, undiluted
- 1 tablespoon butter or margarine, melted
- 1 teaspoon soy sauce

1/2 cup salad croutons (optional) Hot cooked rice

Combine the first 5 ingredients. Spoon into a greased 8-inch square baking dish. Bake, uncovered, at 425° for 20 minutes or until shrimp turn pink. Top with croutons if desired; bake 5 minutes longer. Serve over rice.


Makes 4-6 servings.

Taco Potato Shells

- 3 large baking potatoes
- 1 tablespoon butter or margarine, melted
- 1 pound around beef
- 1 14 1/2 oz. can diced tomatoes, undrained
- 1 envelope taco seasoning
- 1/2 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- 1/3 cup sour cream
- 2 green onions, sliced

Scrub and pierce potatoes. Bake at 375° for 1 hour or until tender. Cut potatoes in half lengthwise. Carefully scoop out pulp, leaving a thin shell. Brush inside and outside of shells with butter. Place cutside up on an ungreased baking sheet; bake uncovered at 375° for 20 minutes. In a skillet, cook beef until no longer pink; drain. Add tomatoes and taco seasoning. Bring to a boil, reduce heat; simmer uncovered 20 minutes. Spoon into potato shells, sprinkle with cheese. Bake uncovered 5-10 minutes longer or until cheese is melted. Top with sour cream and onions.

Make 6 servings.
