Police Ticket Illegally Parked Cars

Will yours be next?

On Tuesday, March 11, 2008, Montgomery County police officers from the 1st district ticketed about 30 cars in the 11200 block of Ashley Drive and some on Schuylkill Road for parking on the wrong side of the street (you must park with the right side tires next to the curb). While the cars ticketed were probably in violation, after decades of non-enforcement, this police action caught everyone by surprise. The RCA had nothing to do with, and was completely unaware of, this police action.

I talked with one of the officers who issued the tickets, Officer Storm. He explained that this action was random, and that other streets (Dewey) and other neighborhoods in this district were also targeted.

Each ticket is \$35.

More facts need to determined, such as, what is police policy, if any, about what might be construed as "dragnet" style enforcement? What determines when a neighborhood – or a street – will be targeted? Every

now and then, police agencies in the Metro area conduct "Operation Smooth Operator" in an attempt to reduce aggressive driving. Along with the Operation is also a public-awareness campaign and radio spots, which many drivers will hear. In contrast, there was no attempt at public awareness before this March 11 action. I am trying to contact the District Commander, Darryl McSwain, about this.

The RCA is on record as supporting the enforcement of the prohibition of blocking the sidewalk. Interestingly, no such cars were ticketed during this enforcement effort, but they might be in the future.

My sense is that there is little that can be done about those owners who received tickets, but at least we're aware now of what can happen. Please folks, park on the right side of the street and do not block the sidewalk.

Update: Commander McSwain was contacted, and he will speak at the May 1 General Meeting.

Minutes of the RCA General Meeting

March 6, 2008

The meeting opened with Girl Scouts from RCA's Troop 1028 performing the flag ceremony, presenting the Colors (American Flag) and leading the meeting in the Pledge of Allegiance. President Mike Saunders passed out a meeting agenda, and passed by unanimous vote: the December General Meeting minutes as published in the March 2008 *Echo*. Also passed by unanimous vote: Treasurer Dell Pillers/Cline report that the RCA is behind in its funding efforts.

A general discussion of membership ensued. Membership is at a respectable 531. Past membership efforts, including the RCA Welcome Wagon and binders we once planned to give new neighbors, were discussed. President Saunders urged RCA'ers to take the initiative and welcome newcomers on your street. Expanded emailings to RCA'ers is a new idea – perhaps email reminders on upcoming RCA General meetings would increase turnout. During this communication discussion, a March *Echo* newsletter article "RCA Hotline" came up. Two RCA'ers took offense at a caller who compared the RCF to Adolf Hitler's Germany and threatened legal action [bring it on!]. The Execs apologized for not editing this call.

The grafitti on the Randolph Hills (closed) recreation center was discussed. The picnic tables had been moved to the rear of the rec center, to be a hangout for young punks.

Volunteers moved the tables back to the front area. Both the Park Police and Park Maintenance were urged to keep up their rounds in Randolph Hills Park.

RCA'er Shaul Kopyto briefed the membership on his efforts to eliminate the tacky snowfence in Rock Creek Park at the intersection of Gaynor and Hunter's Lane. The snowfence is needed to keep people from falling down a gully, but Shaul's photos reveal something more substantial than plastic fencing is required. Parks maintenance has been unresponsive. The Boy Scouts will consider taking it on as an Eagle Scout project, but Mike Saunders will also ask our Councilman Berliner for assistance. The Councilman will also be reminded of the RCA's continuing efforts to save our rec center from being demolished.

Secretary Kevin Kline gave a briefing of nearby zoning and road projects. Most importantly, Randolph Road will be slightly widened and straightened near Dewey Road, just east of Rock Creek Park. Five houses will lose part of their front yards. RCA houses will be unaffected.

The RCA and the RCF are preparing required tax filings – Maryland State Personal Property tax forms. The meeting was adjourned. ■

President's Message

Welcome to Spring. My daffodils and tulips are poking their leaves through the ground and the crocuses are in bloom so it must be true. The rodent in Punxsutawney Pennsylvania (I had to look up the spelling of that town) told us back in February that we would have another 6 weeks of winter and he was probably right this year. As I'm writing this column, I'm also running around the house changing clocks for the spring-ahead daylight savings time change and counting the number of smoke detectors in the house that need a battery change. A trip to the store this afternoon will tell me the most efficient way to buy six 9 volt batteries. Our local fire marshal recommends that we do the seasonal battery change. Did you change your smoke detector battery when the clocks went ahead last month? If not, DO IT NOW! I hate seeing the statistics on deaths in residential fires where children died because they didn't get out because the smoke detectors were not working. That battery change is cheap insurance.

I participated in the mulch delivery by the scouts in the 2nd weekend in March. Good exercise for me and great seeing the number of RCA'ers supporting their scout units. Mulch was sold at a reasonable price and the delivery to the home, placing the bags in the homeowner's location of choice by the scouts is a good "value add" by

Troop 1083 and Crew 1083. I hope you participated this year. The scouts do such good work with the support they get from RCA. I've been involved in scouting for 29 years now as an adult and have never heard of any boy from the RCA sponsored Scout Troop who has been incarcerated. The scouts, Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and Venture Crew will again be participating in the Potomac Watershed Cleanup this year. Also, we can be proud of our two recent Eagle Scouts, Hafez Taghavi and Edward Huggins. Both provided leadership in completing projects of significant value to the community. Edward's Eagle project provided picnic tables and improvements to the courtyard of our own Viers Mill Elementary School and Hafez's project provided a replacement fence for a critical wetlands area at Meadowside Nature Center. Both of these projects were at no cost to the taxpayer and provided a needed improvement on public property. We're looking for specific projects that can be accomplished here in RCA-Land too.

I would like to recommend that everybody be more watchful of the neighbors and the neighborhood. It seems that we are being invaded recently by outsiders who are looking at this as a nice neighborhood to commit a crime. I've been told that neighborhoods where there are neighbors watching out for their neighbors property and calling the police whenever there is something that looks wrong, tend to be off-the-list for easy picking by the criminal element in our society. If it looks wrong, it probably is and you should call the police. You can call police without being named on the complaint if you want to remain anonymous.

We still have not heard the "official fate" of our Rec Center but I expect that it will be razed because I saw the damage done by 50 years of neglect by MNCPPC. That doesn't say we should sit on our hands and take it. Just remember, this same MNCPPC wants to build a new \$80 million headquarters for itself in Silver Spring. I find it inexcusable that they can't find money to maintain current recreation centers or money to replace them but have no problem proposing that we taxpayers fund a new building in one of the most congested areas in the county with some of the highest land values. Why don't they sell the Silver Spring property and use that money to expand the current HQ at one of the park locations they already own. Go figure!

I encourage each of you to continue writing, calling and emailing your council representatives as well as the Park and Planning office on the subject of our parks and our Rec Center. Roger Berliner is our councilman and at large council members representing us are Marc Elrich, Nancy Floreen, George Leventhal and Duchy Trachtenberg. Ike Leggett and the other council members are getting input and comments from their districts too. John Hench, Acting Division Chief, Park Planning and Stewardship

Gardening In Randolph Hills

Spring is here and the garden beckons. Some thoughts about pruning – a typical task home owners think about in the spring.

There are a few simple do's and don'ts which will help maintain your shrubs. Some general information about pruning can be found at:

Generally, prune flowering shrubs AFTER they have bloomed. Pruning before they have bloomed will remove flower buds Of course in our area, the deer may have already eaten the buds. Check the internet for specific information about the shrub you are dealing with.

Most evergreens, if their branches are pruned, will NOT grow back in the same way shrubs like azaleas will do. Yews are the most notable exception – making yews easier to manage in the average garden. Information about pruning evergreens:

Many woody shrubs, such as azaleas, should be pruned by cutting individual branches down into the center of the bush. Many shrubs respond to pruning by putting out a bunch of branches at the point the branch was cut. If an azalea is sheared – cutting the ends of branches to form an smooth "surface" – the result is very bushy branch ends. These bushy ends prevent air and light from reaching the center of the shrub and the center foliage dies off, leaving only an outer shell/edge of leaves and flowers and a brown, leafless center. Granted this is more time consuming than shearing the bushes with a pruner. A nice article about pruning azaleas can be found at:

Shrubs developed for hedges – such as privet or boxwood – do fine with being sheared with a pruner. The top should be slightly narrower than the bottom, so sunlight can reach the bottom branches.


Shrubs such as lilac or forsythia should have some old canes (branches) cut out completely to the ground, otherwise they will gradually rot away – bad for the plant. A few canes should be removed each year. Information on pruning lilacs: http://www.gardenersnet.com/lilac/lilac02.htm

Foundation plantings soften the edges of a home, but if left to grow unchecked can smother a house visually, cover windows (darken interiors), and make the house look smaller. Foundation plantings should be kept pruned below gutter level at the corners and below window level in between corners. Problem is, many houses had cheap evergreens planted by the developers. Once overgrown, these evergreens are almost impossible to prune back gracefully – thus the importance of regular pruning to keep in control.
