White Flint Update

The promise of White Flint is becoming more of a reality every day, and the past several weeks have been no exception. Two site plans have been approved for White Flint and both demonstrate the vision outlined in the White Flint Sector Plan. We continue to monitor progress in White Flint and ensure that property owners and the County alike adhere to the vision of the sector plan.

First, the property we currently call Mid Pike Plaza will soon become Pike & Rose, a mixed use development with retail, new restaurants, a high-end movie theater and an attractive residential building. The site plan for this property, owned by Federal Realty Investment Trust, was approved unanimously by the Planning Board. It will actually ADD trees to the existing site and greatly enhance storm water management with elements like green roofs and LEED certification. The development will also add 215 moderately priced dwelling units and a childcare center. Of course, we also can't ignore the \$1.1 billion in net new tax revenue generated by the new development over the life of the plan. The second plan is on the block north of the new Whole Foods in White Flint. This plan, presented by the JBG Corporation, offers us the most exciting design proposal so far in White Flint. In what could become the most iconic building in White Flint, JBG has

proposed a residential tower on the northwest corner of the property with a cascading glass facade that is difficult to describe with words. So I encourage you to go to the presentation referenced below for pictures. The property will also include a very attractive plaza, an office building, and a more 'soda and popcorn' oriented theater. This site plan was also unanimously approved by the Planning Board. 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President's Message

Yesterday was Dr. Seuss Day and I just came from taking the kids to see "The Lorax". I've read the book many times to my kids and I was struck by the way Thneedville was portrayed in the movie. It was very suburban with single family homes, yards, lots of cars and although glossy and fake it was very unhealthy. In the movie all the trees were made of plastic. In RCA-land we are lucky to be surrounded by lots of real trees, but let's not think for a moment that this is what the Lorax intended.

Don't get me wrong. I love this neighborhood. I love my house. As I write the kids are outside playing in the backyard. Living in this neighborhood is a choice we've all made for various reasons. It's a perfectly acceptable choice to make, but there are consequences that come with that decision. We tend to drive more, we take up more space, and we use more energy. There is a cost associated with this additional consumption, financial and environmental. But apartments and condos near transit aren't for everyone, and we need a variety of housing options to accommodate people in various stages of their life. So while no one (especially not myself) is judging anyone for living in a neighborhood like ours, we should understand that living here comes with some responsibility.

For almost six years, around the same time I joined the RCA board, I've been advocating for increased development around White Flint metro. I've made no bones about it and it's not just because I want more restaurant options. Recently two development projects were approved as part of the White Flint Sector Plan. Combined, both new developments will add about 800 new residential units to White Flint. I can understand why this might make some people nervous. I was once talking to a gentleman who pointed at the new residential tower in White Flint near the Whole Foods. He considered it a monstrosity and said he'd much rather have something "more natural" as he waved his hand out towards a sea of single family homes. However, what many people are coming to realize is that a tower like that preserves (continued on page 8) wooded green space.



New Eagle Scout Greg Gadbois

New Troop 1083 Eagle Scout – Greg Gadbois

Lifelong RCA resident Gregory Gadbois, a member of our Boy Scout Troop 1083, has recently and successfully met all the requirements for attaining Scouting's highest rank – the Eagle Scout Award. Greg passed his Eagle Board of Review this past January 20th. His Eagle Court of Honor is planned for spring.

Greg performed a leadership service project as part of his Eagle Award requirements. His project included planning and executing the construction of an athletic storage shed at Wheaton High School. It involved obtaining the specific need from the athletic director, providing several building options, and gaining MCPS and BSA approvals. He then organized the work crews to erect and paint the building over several weekends. Coordinating the financing, materials, tools, manpower and scheduling, as well as the delegation of tasks, safety, quality-control, final acceptance by the athletic director and report write-up were among the necessary components required to complete the project. Greg thanks his Troop, family, friends and classmates for assisting him with all the phases of the work that included layout, measuring, and cutting/nailing/ screwing wood components. It also involved shingling the roof and painting the exterior with the school colors scarlet and gold. The project took four weekends to complete and Dr. Maura Ryan, the school's athletic director, was very pleased to have the additional storage capacity. His project was completed in the fall of 2011.

Gregory, starting Scouts as a Tiger, received his Arrow of Light Award in Pack 1081 before bridging to Troop 1083. He has served in numerous leadership roles up through Assistant Senior Patrol Leader in the Troop and Crew Chief on three backpacking treks. Greg has earned 52 Merit Badges, earned several Scout religious awards, and has attended Philmont Scout Ranch. He currently serves the Troop as a Junior Assistant Scoutmaster.

Gregory attends the Engineering Academy at Wheaton High School, taking college engineering classes through the academy, and plans to attend college to study sports fitness. As a senior at Wheaton, he also takes an HVAC course at Thomas Edison where he plans use those skills to help finance college. Since his elementary days at Viers Mill, Greg has played in his school's bands as a drummer, trumpeter and bassist. He played Boys Club baseball into middle school where he switched to playing intramural football. He is on Wheaton's varsity football, lacrosse, and indoor track teams. He played in the school's jazz band for two years. Greg is also active in his church, Holy Cross in Garrett Park. He has given back to his community as indicated by the many Student Service Learning hours he has accrued since middle school.

Congratulations to Greg for attaining his Eagle goal and best wishes to him for success in his future endeavors.

March Executive Meeting Minutes

1. Call to order

Board nominations for 2012 – 2013: The call for nominations was made in the February meeting. RCA President Dan Hoffman and Karen Helfert are termed out of their positions, as per RCA by-laws.

- 2. Slate adopted by the RCA Board [See page 12 for approved slate]
 - 3. Old business:
- a. Our membership coordinator, Cindy Zelaya, had technical difficulties, and hasn't been able to follow up. We are falling short of our goal of 500, and put a burden on RCA's resources. We will have to focus on the new season to make a new membership drive for the new season, starting September 2012. Although our 2011/12 membership drive is over, residents can join anytime. We will look at our Board positions and define specific tasks and responsibilities for each board position. Membership needs to be a priority task of a board member.
- b. Quiet Zone: There was a useful article printed in the Gazette, reprinted in the Echo. We have more active involvement on this issue, and hope to make progress on installing the Quiet Zone.
- c. Beautification: Four signs are installed, and we have one more sign to put up. We hope to collect more funds through the upcoming music fest fundraiser, and to have more money for landscaping and beautification.
 - 4. Standard Business
- a. Minutes of the 2/2/12 meeting approved by unanimous voice vote.
- b. Treasurer's Report: We are on track with our expenses, although low in collected membership fees, due to lower than expected enrollment. The budget formulations for the new fiscal year start after the April 2012 general meeting. The new board will address future projected expenses and income. We're discussing switching from SunTrust to CapitalOne.
 - c. Committee Chair reports:

Environmental: We're moving ahead together with the Planning Board in our efforts to rename the Waverly-Schuylkill Park to Mark Shore Park, in commemoration and appreciation of Mark Shore, son of State Senator Frank Shore, who died in 1998. (The name of the creek on old historic maps was recorded as Glendarragh.)

Planting around signs will be a big work project, and we need neighbors to sign up to pitch in with work. We'll set some dates (and rain dates) for the work and publish them on the RCA listserve.

Christiana Drapkin suggested that we install a permanent sign post at certain points in the neighborhood, where we can post information for events in the neighborhood, other information. We need location suggestions. We're also looking to get weatherproof vinyl banners, announcing our events.

The next community further down Beach Drive fol-

lowed our lead and installed "Rock Creek Palisades" signs.

Quiet Zone: Matt Tifford and the Quiet Zone committee continue to work on the Randolph Road crossing issues.

Public Safety: no report submitted. We plan to hold a new community public safety workshop at an upcoming General Membership meeting.

Education: County council for the CIP hearing took place, and we testified in support of reinstating the modernization of Wheaton HS. Nancy Navarro will attend the Wheaton HS PTA meeting on March 20 at 7 p.m. Nancy Floreen is at-large, and we count on her support as well. Roger Berliner is District 1. We urge our RCA members to keep emailing letters of support for reinstalling the Wheaton HS modernization into the budget cue.

The Veirs Mill ES addition broke ground. Garrett Park ES is finished and back in operation. Walter Johnson's renovation, which was done in a phasing manner, had lost some of their funding (which was not appropriated in full) for some of their phases. Tilden students are still at Woodward for the duration of their renovation.

The Pre-release Center on Nebel Street had two escapes in January. Both escapees were apprehended shortly thereafter. They are removed from the program, sent back to their correction facility, and will be charged for an added violation for escape. Someone who escaped in September last year, was sentenced for another period (ranging from 18 months to 7 years). There has been a series of White Flint robberies. Nobody from the Pre-release Center was involved in those. The Pre-Release Center is always looking for mentors, and for volunteers to teach classes, mainly pre-employment skills, GED, light employment skills. The mentoring coordinator can be reached at 240 773-4200.

- 5. New Business
- a. We are planning to hold the Second Annual RCA Music Fest on 5/6/12, from 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. It is a great fundraising opportunity for us, and a creative way to bring our Randolph Hills neighbors together. Please sign up and purchase tickets! The proceeds will benefit various neighborhood beautification projects. We have four music acts scheduled for our entertainment, and we have sponsors lined up again.
- b. Community Bazaar will be on 5/5/12 from 8:00am-1:00pm
- c. For the April 5 General Membership Meeting, we plan to invite an arborist to address our trees pruning issues, and to get recommendations for prudent planting of new trees. Rock Creek forestry issues and erosion will also be addressed.

Park Staff and Members of the Planning Board,

I write to you today on behalf of the Randolph Civic Association to ask for a special exception to the Individual Park Naming and Dedication Policy for Waverly-Schuylkill Park. Located between Waverly Road in the Town of Garrett Park and Schuylkill Road in the community of Randolph Hills, Waverly-Schuylkill Park is a little known gem in the vast collection of neighborhood parks in Montgomery County. Featuring a lighted and paved path and bridge connecting Garrett Park and Randolph Hills, Waverly-Schuylkill Park provides the citizens of Randolph Hills easy access to the Garrett Park Marc Station, and a preferred pedestrian route to White Flint Mall, Strathmore Arts Center, and the Grosvenor Metro Station. Through this park flows Glendarragh Creek, whose streambed restoration project was the recent recipient of an environmental design award. Since the streambed restoration, the park has become a home to ducks, frogs, turtles, hawks, fox, and a large deer population.

Not too long ago this park was a very different place, a nameless private lot, held by owners with little or no interest in it. The land was overgrown with Kudzu and littered with old tires and rusting appliances. As a result of nearby development, the creek had become a deep gully carved out by the fast running storm water from nearby roads and parking lots. Nothing lived in it. There was no bridge and no paved path.

Starting back in the late 1970's Mark Shore, along with his father Senator Frank Shore and the rest of his family, began a process to turn this land into the beautiful park it is today. Mark led a multi-year community effort to dig out the Kudzu and clean out the garbage. The Shores then petitioned the Department of Parks and the Planning Board to purchase the initial section of property and then build the path, bridge, and lights.

Sadly, Mark Shore succumbed to Multiple Sclerosis in November of 1998. However, his father, Senator Frank Shore and younger brother Matthew Shore, continued to work to bring improvements to the park. Since Mark's death, Frank and Matthew successfully petitioned the Planning Board to purchase adjoining wooded property along the train tracks and later donated the Mark Shore memorial bench which now sits at the park entrance at Schuylkill Road. In 2002, Senator Shore initiated a series of meet-

ings with park officials which led to the award winning streambed restoration project. Even more recently the Shore's created a mulched trail, "Mark's Nature Trail", through Waverly-Schuylkill Park which has become a popular destination for neighborhood families and dog walkers.

Waverly-Schuylkill Park exists today as a result of the years of time and effort put in by Mark Shore and his family. In recognition of their exceptional civic service, we ask that this park be renamed "Mark Shore Park" and exempted from any financial contribution requirement under the new policy. We ask that the park be renamed, not dedicated, as only a renaming could adequately honor the efforts of Mark Shore and his family.

plan for the property that is currently home to White Flint Mall will come before the Planning Board soon. Many of you have already seen the presentation of the plan from the Lerner Corporation and the Tower Company. It reflects the growing movement away from the suburban, auto-oriented shopping mall. One other sketch plan has already been approved but has not yet moved forward into the site plan process. That plan involves the Fitzgerald property on Rockville Pike. There is no estimated time frame for that plan to advance further. We will continue to monitor the progress of all of these plans and any new ones that may arrive.

That tower provides about 300 residential units on the same land area that four of our homes occupy. The building averages less than one car per residential unit. The cost of delivering water and electricity are much less because you don't have to run miles of pipe or wire over a more spread out area. The units are also much more efficient to heat and cool.

Of course I'm not saying we all need to sell our houses and cars and move into an apartment near metro. That would be ridiculous. Like I mentioned earlier, we need a variety of options to accommodate people at various stages in their life. Living in a more urban environment isn't better, just different. Having urban places in the County makes the County better for all of us by creating that variety. So I don't think of White Flint as 'over there' and RCA-land as 'over here'. I think of them as one, diverse connected community. And when an opportunity comes along to build additional housing near metro, and protect assets like the Agricultural Reserve (which covers a third of our County) or park space around Rock Creek we have a responsibility to embrace change. The County has a tremendous supply of single family homes already and accommodating growth by building more sprawl (and cutting down more trees) is unacceptable. We can't stop the population of the County from increasing, and the County needs to do a much better job of attracting young professionals who will expand the tax base of this County. We need exciting urban places in areas like White Flint, Twinbrook, Shady Grove, Wheaton, and Glenmont.

This is my final message as president of the RCA. By the time the next Echo comes out we will have had our board elections and Chad Salganik will take over President. Chad is a good man who understands the concepts I have discussed here and he has served our community well. I can think of no one more capable than he to act as RCA president. Thank you all for the opportunity to serve you. I have made many great friends by getting involved with the RCA and have gotten so much more out of it than I could have imagined. Most importantly though the RCA has developed a good reputation as a community that takes responsibility and cares about the future of this County by embracing the need for change. I'm proud of this and what we've accomplished. I think back to Dr. Seuss and the Lorax when I look at the countless hours RCA volunteers spend caring for our neighborhood. Unless we all do our part in taking responsibility for this County and our community, nothing is going to get better. It's not. SO! You're in charge of RCA-land. Treat it with care.





In an effort to make RCA-Land a bit greener, and in honor of Earth Day coming up on Sunday April 22, we offer some tips for recycling plastic:

It is OKAY to put these types of Plastic in the Blue Recycle Bins:

- Plastic bottles (resin # on bottom of bottle should say 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, or 7); Labels and plastic rings around the neck of the bottles are okay; Plastic lids are okay to recycle but remove from the bottle first. Empty and rinse bottles first
- Plastic containers, tubs and lids (resin # on bottom should say 2, 3, 4 or 5); Empty and rinse before placing in recycle bin; Plastic lids are okay to recycle.

It is NOT OKAY to put these types of plastic in the recycle bins:

- Plastic wrap, bags, or film are NOT recyclable
- Non-bottle items made from resins #1 or any type of #6 (polystyrene and Styrofoam™ products)
- plastic bags or wrapping
- · plastic knives, forks, and spoons
- "clamshell" containers
- packaging from small electronics, jewel cases from CDs.
