Yard sale signs. The RCA has yard sale signs to loan to residents for free.

House on Ashley Drive. The owner is facing another court date for excessive housing violations. Owner was fined earlier this year.

Graffiti. An RCA resident, who wishes to keep a low profile, offers to immediately remove graffiti if this resident is notified. Richard Zierdt offered to be the go-between. If anyone spots graffiti in our neighborhood, please call Richard Zierdt (phone # on page 2) so he can relay the message to the "remover."

Snitch Fund. It has been suggested that the RCA offer an award to anyone who can provide information leading to the arrest and successful prosecution of anyone "tagging" the neighborhood (graffiti).

Echo in Spanish. It has been suggested that the *Echo* have editions available in Spanish. The ExCom thinks a translator would be necessary, either to write the *Echo* him/herself, or to proofread a translation made by a computer. The ExCom felt a Spanish edition could be possible if someone would volunteer to translate it.

Neighborhood signs. Richard Zierdt showed some pictures he took of more elaborate neighborhood entrance signs in the area. Most are made of masonry. A slide show of these signs could be presented at an RCA general meeting.

The RCA is now entirely in State district 18 (Chevy Chase, Garrett Park). Up until the last re-districting in 2000, we were split between districts 17 (Rockville) and 19 (Wheaton).

As of RCA press time, we have not confirmed, but unless there's a scheduling conflict, he should be here. If he cannot attend this time, we will try again on March 3, the next regular RCA meeting.

Reporting Streetlight Outages Online

This is an updated version of the same article from the December 2002 Echo. We should post this information on our own web site, www.randolphcivic.org


It's getting easier all the time! You – Yes, You – can now report malfunctioning street lights on-line, 24 hours a day, and you don't need to walk out in the night to get the utility pole number! Here's how (one of many ways to get there):

- 1. Go to www.montgomerycountymd.gov
- 2. Click on "Departments" (left side of screen)
- 3. Click on "Public Works and Transportation" (right side, pan down a bit)
- 4. Click on "Service Index" in the middle of the 2nd paragraph
- 5. Click on "streetlights" (under "S" pan down a bit)
- 6. Click on "Maintenance"

From there, you can select from a couple of ways to report the outtage. One way is to simply click on the County map that is shown, and successively "click down" our neighborhood and your street. Eventually, aerial photos of our neighborhood are shown. You can even see the roofs of our houses! Not all utility poles are shown, however.

[Fair comment, but "Westminster" is not a housing subdivision name, at least one recognized by Montgomery County land records. It is actually a part of Randolph Farms. We think "Westminster" was a name used by the developer to "name" the area for marketing purposes. Nonetheless, the RCA does have a sign at Hunters and Randolph Roads with "Westminster" on it. The legal name is shown on your property tax bill under "Property Description" near the upper right side of the statement. Montrose Park and

Hilltop Square need to be added to the map.]

U.S. President Voting Results for our Precinct, 04-15 at the Rocking Horse Center

There was a huge turnout on Election Day, which happened to have unusually wonderful weather! I got the following figures from the County's on-line election web site, www.777vote.org. I was disappointed that Question C did not pass in the County, but it nearly did in our precinct. The Vote No group raised \$62,000 to fight the three ballot questions; the Vote Yes On C group spent under \$3,000. Maybe next time... Question B (Consecutive Term Limits) did pass here, but not in the County, and not by much. This is surprising, since Question B was in the news the least of the three ballot questions.

I heard that 10 votes were not counted (because of machine malfunction(s)), and I asked the Board of Elections about it. I have not received a reply yet, but will pursue this issue and let you know. ■

Dear Mrs. Brown



With the holidays upon us, this is an excellent time to teach children some fundamental manners. Ensconced in the glow of family tradition and merry festivities, the learning process can be fun! Whether a small or large family dinner, guests dropping by, relatives visiting and telephoning, gift-giving and receiving, all sorts of skills can be taught during this season. One of the funny things about being a child is not consistently doing what you know you ought. However, if the knowledge is there, children will often draw upon it when they are older and around other people who behave in such a way. Of course, the best of all worlds is to enforce as many manners as possible. In the short and long run, adults are even making life easier for themselves!

What to Wear:

Dressing up is traditional and since holidays do not come around that often, it doesn't hurt to wear something nice. It



sets the tone for the season's festivities and emphasizes that family and holiday get-togethers are special.

Introductions:

At a party it is not necessary to shake hands with friends, relatives or other people you know and have seen recently, but when you are introduced to a stranger always shake hands.

Answering the phone:

Even very small children can learn to answer the phone properly. "Hello, Sanchez residence. This is Maria."

The caller should introduce themselves if they are not a frequent caller who is easily identified by voice. If the caller does not, teach the child to ask, "Who is calling please?" so they are able to tell the recipient of the call who is on the line and would like to speak with them.

Just as important as hello, every child must learn to end the call with "good-bye." Teach them to never hang up or give the phone to the adult unless there has been a polite "good-bye."

Thank-You Notes:

Thank-you notes should be written as soon as possible. They don't have to be long; they just have to include the right stuff. Good quality stationary or decorative note cards are nice, but the receiver will care more about the written words of appreciation. When writing the note, keep in mind that you want the reader to smile and be glad their kindness was appreciated.

First, express gratitude for the specific gift or kindness.
 Never say that you don't like the gift, already have one or plan to exchange it.

- If you received money, always refer to the intended use of the money. "Thanks so much for the twenty dollars. I have wanted the new CD by my favorite group, and now I can get it!"
- Say something about the gift giver. People appreciate comments that show interest in them as individuals and not just as sources of gifts. "I miss you Grandfather and wish you were here to play with my new toy with me."

Gifts:

Children should learn not to touch or play with other people's possessions unless invited to. This is especially important at a time when gifts are flowing everywhere. If you just received a new car, would you want your friend or neighbor to drive it around the block first? Children do need to share, but do they need to share every new toy before they themselves have had a chance to play with it?

1 good tsp. of cinnamon


1 good tsp. of nutmeg


