Minutes of the November Executive Meeting

The Execs reviewed and agreed to a budget, which will be presented to the General Membership for approval. Traffic was discussed, including our request to the County to restrict rush hour traffic from turning from Randolph Road onto Rocking Horse (as voted by the Membership). Note: School buses are exempt from this restriction.

The new bulk purchase of flowering spring bulbs was a huge success (as reported in the last *Echo*). Treasurer Richard Zierdt was responsible for this new initiative, and kudos go to him and the Boy Scouts who re-packaged the bulbs and distributed them.

Sam's Club cards have been distributed. Next year the RCA (business) membership price will climb to \$35! Vice-president George Gadbois gave a status update on school issues.

The next topic was the Parks Commission initiative, whereby soccer groups are invited into Local Parks, like Randolph Hills, to play. The Execs planned a strategy to fight this new initiative, and our concerns, communicated over the years to Parks, have been ignored.

Montrose Parkway West in Full Swing

Construction of Montrose Parkway West is ongoing as I write this. On Monday, November 14, 2005, County Executive Doug Duncan held a press conference (and dirt-turning celebration) at the site where bulldozers cleared some trees (next to the Kaiser Permanente building at 2101 East Jefferson Street, a block south of the intersection with Montrose Road).

I attended the event, as did about 15 protesters. The press conference was uneventful, and went off pretty much without a hitch, except a few of the protesters shouted slogans a few times. As part of the North Bethesda Congress, of which the RCA is a member, I had worked with several of them throughout the years as debate about the Parkway raged on. This does not mean I agreed with them – I don't. But we were civil with one another.

This section of the Parkway will run from Montrose Road west (close to I-270) to Randolph Road. However, the

intersection with Randolph Road is a Maryland State transportation project, where Randolph/Montrose will go over Rockville Pike, and I believe completion of this project is not scheduled until 2010. Mr. Duncan got a question about this at the press conference: Why start Montrose Parkway now when the State won't start until 2010? He replied that the County is going to get the road going, and that the State will follow. Mr. Duncan is running for governor in 2008. If he wins, I'm sure there will be added emphasis to complete the State's project.

This project is *not* the section of Montrose Park East that will run from Rockville Pike to Viers Mill Road - going behind Montrose and Franklin Parks. That section is still in the planning stages, and no funding for its construction has been approved.

Dog Leashing, Public Urination Subject of New County Laws

The Montgomery County Council has passed two new laws, one requiring dogs to be leashed in public places, the other banning public urination.

Under the new law, dogs must be leashed in public places. Previously, leashing was not required as long as a dog was under its owner's verbal or non-verbal control. But council members received complaints that dogs were permitted to run free at public parks, and council members felt that the new law was necessary to protect kids and vulnerable adults. Fines begin at \$100 for the first offense and go up to \$500. The only exception is in designated dog exercise areas. The county currently has three dog exercise areas, at Black Hill Regional Park, Ridge Road Recreation Park, and Wheaton Regional Park.

The council also passed a bill making it illegal for a person to urinate or defecate in public. Violation of the law is punishable by a fine of up to \$1,000, or arrest. ■







RCA Meetings



Dear Mrs. Brown



Good manners aren't always in the realm of actions such as how to use a fork properly or place a napkin in your lap. When children are taught to be kind, polite and honest, they also develop character.

KINDNESS DOES COUNT

Children are more sensitive to having their feelings

hurt. Talk to your child about feelings and how everyone has them. Don't ever ridicule or make fun of another person in your child's presence. Never tell or laugh at ethnic jokes. If your own child is being teased in a hurtful way by another child, show them how to respond through role-playing and not to respond in kind. If confessing, "That hurts my feelings" doesn't turn the tide, a child is never too young to learn to "walk away" from a bad situation.

Children sometimes display their anger by hitting or screaming at other children. This is an excellent opportunity to teach them how to express their emotions without giving in to knee-jerk reactions. Learning to control emotions at a young age will instill a habit which will benefit them their entire life. Talking to older children with reason is good, but younger children may need a silly game of counting to ten before responding. The idea is to come up with a plan of how to buy time to think before reacting.

Pets should be treated with kind and gentle behavior. Pets are wonderful for the very fact they give unconditional love. For the very young, use stuffed animals to learn how to handle pets. But real animals aren't stuffed and children may tend to hold and hug them too tightly. If your child is loud, rough and ceaselessly chases/annoys an animal, they may be too young for a pet.

POLITENESS GETS YOU A LOT FARTHER

Children learn more from what they see than what they are told. Monkey see, monkey do. If we expect children to say "please" and "thank you," then parents should say it to them. "Would you pick up your toys off the floor, please?" "Thank you so much for cutting the grass. It looks great!" When a request is put politely, the results are usually more favorable than from a demand. Which would you be more apt to respond to with respect? "Turn down that music or I'll shut if off!!" or "Sweetheart, would you please turn your music down? It's really way too loud."

Peers can be a great influence too. When another child has done something nice, don't waste the example! Be quick to remark, "Wasn't that a polite thing to do?" Likewise, recognize your child's polite moments and praise them. Children will repeat behavior that gets good reviews.

HONESTY IS THE BEST POLICY

Encourage honesty in your children. Honesty can be one of the most important models set by any adult. Let your children see you return the incorrect excess change. Let them hear you turn down an invitation by an honest response, rather than a made-up excuse. Don't brag how you cheated on your tax return. When you make a mistake, admit it! Have you ever met someone who never admits they are wrong or made a mistake? It's always someone else's fault? Teach them its okay to admit to mistakes and when it happens, to apologize. People are generally very accepting of sincere apologies. Honesty in the little things instills the character to be honest in bigger ways. Go out of your way to give a dropped penny or quarter to a customer ahead of you in line.

Let your children know from an early age that lying is simply not acceptable, end of story. Often times children will lie to cover up something they did that was wrong. They should know they will get in more trouble for the lie than for

clip and save

what they did. Instill in them how special the truth is and how proud you are when they are truthful. Teach children that a clean conscience is more important than any wrongdoing they may have done. Everyone makes mistakes, that's how we learn. Developing a good conscience in your child will actually curtail deliberate wrongdoing in the future. Honesty is the hallmark of trustworthiness.

Recycling Notes: When Your Items are "Tagged"

From the Montgomery County Division of Solid Waste Services

Recycling crews place orange tags on your materials when they are not accepted for pickup that day. The tag explains why the material was left at the curb. Please contact the Division of Solid Waste Services (DSWS) online or by phone at 240-777-6410 if you have questions about the tag or why your items were not collected.

Some common reasons for tags include:

Yard trim set out in plastic bags. Leaves, grass, brush, and other yard trimmings must be packaged in paper bags, reusable cans, or with twine, as relevant.

Options:

- a) Repackage your yard trim properly, and set out on your next recycling collection day.
- b) Take the yard trim bag(s) directly to the Shady Grove Transfer Station. If you go to the Transfer Station, you do not need to repackage, because you may simply empty your plastic bag(s) of material onto the yard trim pile, and then put your bag(s) into the trash.

Non-container items in blue bins. Blue recycling bins are for "commingled" materials – cans, bottles, and jars – only. Items like toilet seats and furnace filters should go into your normal household trash.

Options:

- a) Place trash items into your normal household trash on your next trash collection day.
- b) Take the items for disposal to the Shady Grove Transfer Station yourself.

Scrap metal collection not requested for items set at the curb. Large appliances and other bigger metal items are recyclable through the County's scrap metal recycling program. But, scrap metal recycling is done by a special truck; the regular recycling crew (and the trash crew) will leave these large metal items behind.

Salmon with Pistachio, Basil, & Mint Sauce



In blender, mix until coarsely chopped:

- 1/4 cup shelled pistachios
- 1/4 cup fresh basil
- 1/4 cup fresh mint
- 1 garlic clove

Add to blender, mix until smooth:

- 1/2 cup of butter (softened to room temperature)
- 2 Tbls. Lemon juice

Put mixture in refrigerator to chill (can be done up to 4 days in advance) *This can also be frozen and used later if serving for less than six.*

Place in buttered casserole dish:

• 6 Salmon fillets

Pour 1/2 cup of dry white wine over fillets, sprinkle with salt and pepper.

Bake in 400° oven for 10 minutes until top of fillets are opaque.

Remove fillets from oven and distribute butter mixture over each fillet. Return to oven for another 5 minutes or until the fillets are opaque in the middle.

To serve: Ladle sauce from bottom of dish and place on top of each fillet. *Serves 6*.

Options.

- a) Request a scrap metal collection online or by phone at 240-777-6410. Requests must be received by 9:30
 a.m. on the business day before your collection day.
- b) Take the items for disposal to the Shady Grove Transfer Station yourself.
- c) If any of the items are in usable or reparable condition, consider offering them to others through The Freecycle Network (www.freecycle.org).
