Proposed Bylaw Changes

There are a number of areas in our bylaws that I believe need addressing. One is the term limits of RCA officers, and another is advance notice of RCA motions. RCA bylaws are available online at www.randolphcivic.org.

An easy amendment I recommend is to change the date of the "annual meeting" (when elections are held) from May to June. This would reflect current practice, and would correspond with our fiscal year, July to June. Article IV, Section 2 would then read: "The annual meeting and election of officers shall be held on the first Thursday in June of each year unless otherwise voted by a majority of the members at a regular meeting." Also, June should be designated as a "regular" (General) meeting month. Article IV, Section 1 would read: "The regular meetings of the Association shall be held on the first Thursday of October, December, March, May, and June and at such places as shall be designated by the President and published in the *Echo*, unless otherwise voted by a majority of the members present at a regular meeting."

I am a big supporter of (consecutive) term limits, from leaders of volunteer organizations to the U.S. president. All RCA officers are subject to term limits (two consecutive years, max) in the same office. Term limits usually ensure that new blood is introduced on a regular basis, and gives more people a chance to serve. However, when no one volunteers for a particular position, we've got a problem. I have been RCA's treasurer for – I don't know – about 10 years, but no one else has volunteered to serve in this capacity. Kevin Kline has also ably served as secretary longer than the bylaws allow.

So here's the proposal: Amend the bylaws to permit successive terms ONLY IF no one else volunteers to be a candidate at the elections in June. The last sentence of Article III, Section 2 would then read "No person shall serve more than two consecutive terms in the same office, unless no other person was nominated or volunteered for the same office." If you oppose this change, be prepared to become treasurer or secretary in June.

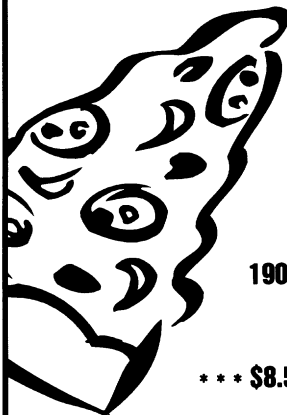
RCA bylaws give its president great latitude in dealing with new business at RCA meetings. Article IV, Section 9 reads "The President shall determine whether any resolution or recommendation is of an emergency nature or whether such resolution or recommendation requires consideration of the Executive Committee or one of the Standing Committees; provided, that a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the members present shall call for immediate action on the matter and shall override the decision of the President."

However, the *Echo*, where most news of RCA import is discussed, is not mentioned. All RCAers should be given the chance to review motions, whenever possible, before they are made at general RCA meetings. Of course, there are issues of timeliness that require immediate action. But in general, advance notice is best in the interest of fairness. I offer the following change, so that Article IV, Section 9 would read: "The President shall determine whether any resolution or recommendation is of an emergency nature, or whether such resolution or recommendation requires consideration of the Executive Committee or one of the Standing Committees, or whether such resolution or recommendation requires prior publication in the *Echo*; provided, that a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the members present shall call for immediate action on the matter and shall override the decision of the President.

I will move adoption of the above amendments at the March 1 General Meeting.

Piggy-Back Tax: Would you increase it?

I testified at a public hearing February 6, 2001 on the County Executive's proposed changes to the county budget for 2000-2001. Among several "adjustments" to the County public school system's capital improvements (additional classrooms and renovated schools, basically), he proposed delays in renovating Walter Johnson High School (Montrose Park residents, take note). The meeting was packed, with school proponents (parents, basically) testifying how badly their schools needed more and better classrooms, gyms, heating and air conditioning systems, and fewer portables. One council member, Derrick Berlage, asked if citizens would support a tax increase if it went to pay for school infrastructure. Most at the meeting voiced "yes."

There simply is not enough money (currently) to support all the things our public schools need. There can be differences of opinion in what constitutes a "good school" and "good grades," but surely we can agree that decent schools should be structurally sound, and should not have crumbling walls, peeling paint, or portable classrooms.

I would like to get a "sense of the RCA" regarding taxes and education. Would the RCA support a two-percent increase (from 2.92% to 2.98%) in the piggy-back tax (local tax for Montgomery County) IF such an increase would be used ONLY to correct deficiencies in school facilities? We could define what a "deficiency" is, and which facilities are meant. But the basic idea is the support of school infrastructure. I will make a motion at the March 1 General Meeting.

Development Impact Tax: Time for a Change

Montgomery County places a tax on new development called the "Development Impact Tax for Major Highways" or simply just the "Development Impact Tax." This tax (Chapter 52, Article VII, sections 52-47 through 52-59), which applies only to Germantown and parts of the eastern county (Farmland area), is levied to pay for transportation infrastructure when new developments are built. The theory is that developers should help pay at least for some of the roads that become necessary when new developments are built. Sounds fair to me.

The problem is that roads are not the only burden placed on county services when new developments are built. Most notable are new burdens on education (with

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more children), safety (police, fire, etc), and utilities (water and sewer, gas and electric lines). Yes, new homes pay property taxes, but who pays for the new schools that must be built to accommodate additional students? We all do, including residents in RCA. This leaves less money for existing schools, which need renovation and/or additions (and fewer portable classrooms).

The rates charged for new development come up for review every two years, and now is the time to comment. There will be a public hearing regarding the Impact Tax on March 6, 7:30 pm, in the County Office Building, across Maryland Avenue from the Rockville Library. The bill is 4-01.

My motion would be "The RCA believes a suitable tax must be applied to all new development to cover the cost of all additional public services, be it for education, transportation, safety, or utilities. County law "Development Impact Tax for Major Highways" should be revised to acknowledge that costs for public services includes more than transportation alone." I will make this motion at the RCA General Meeting March 1.

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Treasurer's Report

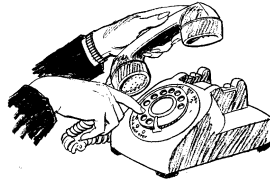

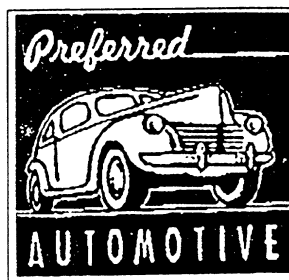
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Neighborhood Notes

Zoning News

Montgomery County law requires commercial and multi-family property owners to remove all snow and ice from public walkways between parking areas and their front entrances. The snow & ice must be removed within 24 hours after precipitation ends, and must be done "to the extent necessary to provide safe pedestrian pathways." The fine is \$50. The Department of Public Works and Transportation "strongly encourages" residents to clean sidewalks in front of their homes. You should know that many northern communities, such as Mt. Lebanon, PA, have for many years required homeowners to also clean their front sidewalks within 24 hours. Long ago these communities legally clarified the concerns and exceptions needed for elderly and disabled homeowners.



Reasons for Traffic Congestion

A growing region. Since 1970, The Washington Metropolitan area's population has increased by 1.4 million people, while jobs have increased by 1.5 million. All of the population growth has been in the suburbs.

More people driving. Between 1980 and 2000, Montgomery County's population increased 48%. People own more cars. Between 1975 and 2000, while Montgomery County population grew 43%, the number of registered vehicles increased by 76%.

People are driving further. Nationally, the average number of miles driven per vehicle increased 22% between 1983 and 1990.

More two-worker households. In Montgomery County, between 1950 and 1997, the percentage of women working increased from 32% to 67%.

The County's Transportation Policy Task Force newsletter (January 2001) reports that "...there is no one single solution – not roads, not transit – that effectively deals with congestion...Building new transportation facilities [roads] is not easy. Here are some of the reasons: The funding available for new [roads] has not kept pace with increases in demand, nor is it expected to in the future; In a maturing county, such as Montgomery, there is less vacant land, particularly in our urban areas...; Established neighborhoods often view new [roads] as potentially threatening to community quality of life; Many wish to preserve the green space rather than building more transportation facilities.

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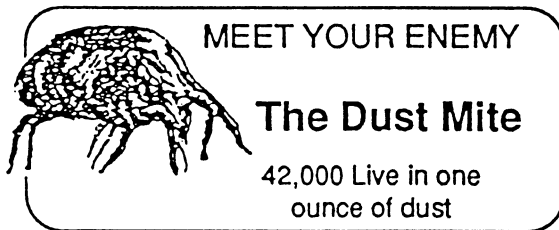

Swanson Cheddar & Roasted Garlic Biscuits

- 5 cups all-purpose baking or buttermilk biscuit mix
- 1 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- 1 14 1/2 oz. can Swanson Seasoned Chicken Broth with Roasted Garlic (99% fat free)

Mix biscuit mix, cheese and broth to form a soft dough. Drop by spoonfuls onto ungreased baking sheet and bake according to package directions. Makes 24.

Almond Bacon Chicken

- 4 strips bacon
- 4 boneless skinless chicken breast halves
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 10 3/4 oz. condensed cream of onion soup, undiluted
- 1/4 cup chicken broth
- 1/4 cup sliced almonds, toasted

In a microwave, cook bacon on paper towels on high 1-3 minutes or until partially cooked. Wrap a bacon strip around each chicken breast; sprinkle with pepper. Arrange in an 8-inch square microwave-safe dish. Cover and microwave on high for 7 minutes, drain.

In a bowl, combine soup and broth. Cover, microwave for 2 minutes. Spoon around chicken. Cook uncovered 5-7 minutes until juices run clear. Let stand 5 minutes before serving. Sprinkle with almonds.

Make 4 servings.



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The History of RCA-land

During the US Civil War, our area was located near the seat of the Federal Government, and just across the Potomac from the Confederacy. This led to an early occupation by Federal Troops. There was only one battle in this area, but troops from both sides passed through on several occasions, and livestock, crops, trees, and fences were taken and torn up each time. Rockville was the County seat, but had a population of only 500.

On Saturday, April 20, 1861, the Confederate flag was flown from the Rockville Courthouse by States' Rights supporters. Many were waiting for Maryland Governor Hicks to convene the Legislature and secede from the USA. That day President Lincoln called for troops. Sometime later the Governor complied with President Lincoln's call to arms.

On June 27, 1861, Federal troops passed through Rockville and began camping in the surrounding area (that's RCA-land). These were part of Colonel Stone's troops defending Washington and the C&O Canal. Veirs Bouic, Maryland's States' Attorney, complained that US soldiers camped at Great Falls forcibly entered several homes along the Maryland road to the Falls, including the John Willson and Samuel Willson homes. The soldiers were searching for arms, but also carried off eggs and poultry, and frightened the womenfolk greatly. That day Mr. Bouic wrote a formal complaint to Colonel Stone about this illegal conduct.

Gardening Tips

By late March, buy a \$20 lawn pH tester, or take a thimble of soil to a garden shop to test if lime is needed. It probably is, so buy pulverized dolomitic limestone and raise your lawn pH to 6.5 (ideal) by summer. Apply weed-killer to your lawn now to stop the spring emergence of wild onions (super-tough), clover, chickweed, ragweed, etc. If you have a gypsy moth problem, apply Superior Oil under ideal conditions (no rain, temperatures above 40 degrees).

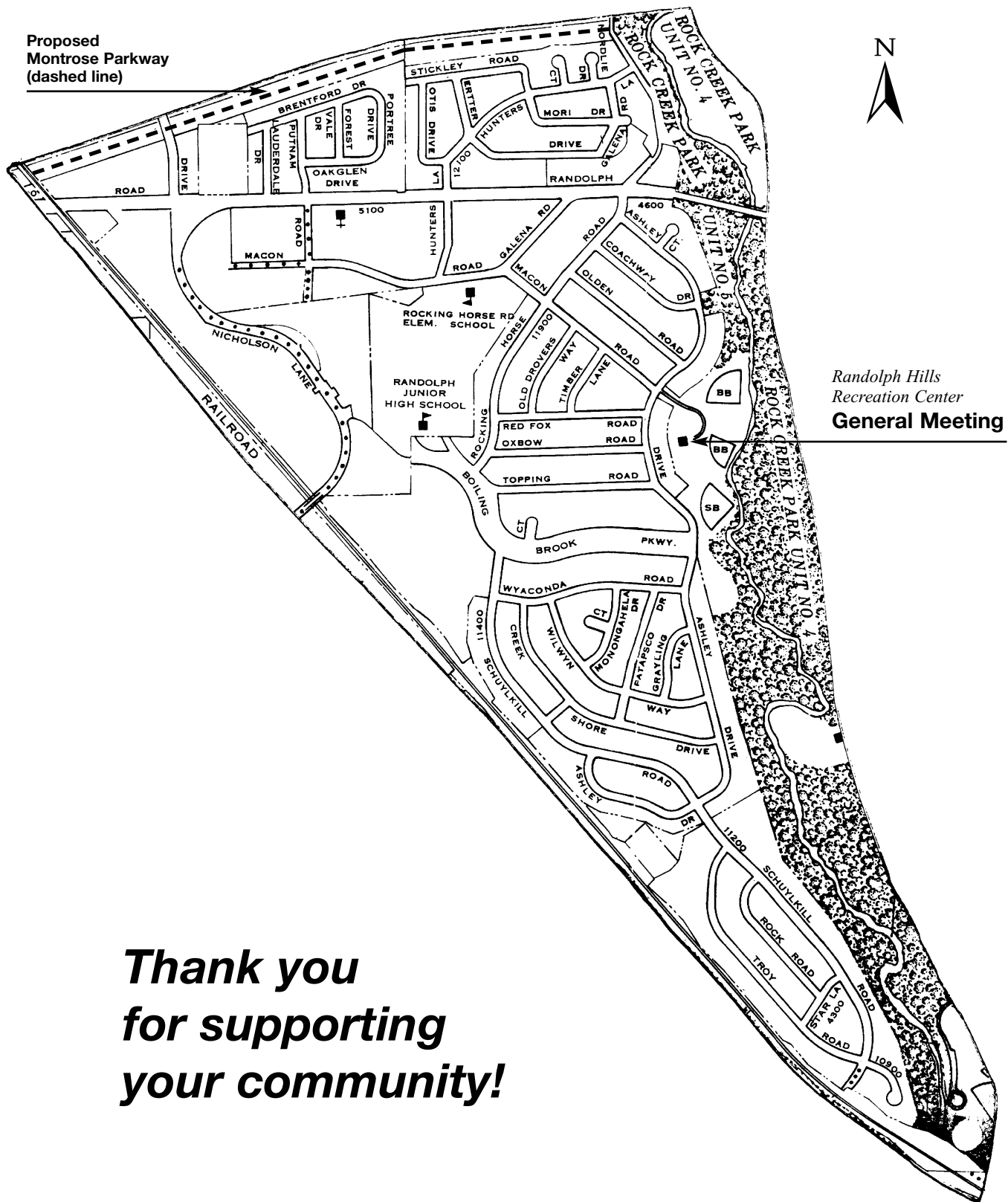


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RCA Meetings
