# **President's Message**

By the time you get your March edition of the *Echo*, the weather should more closely resemble Spring in RCA-Land. We are experiencing a brief (I hope) cold spell in the later part of January and first part of February as I write this column, and now that March has arrived, hopefully it came in without the last of the winter lion's roar. Hope everybody survived the winter and will now start thinking about more pleasant things than snow shovels and dead car batteries. Next month, in my April message, I plan to say a little more about the fun I had in February with the snow blower, if I do get to go out with it this year.

By now, many of you have noticed the new street lights installed in RCA-land. We have been successful in moving the county in that direction. Street lights are considered a deterrent to crime. We need your help in reporting burnt-out street lights (240-777-2190). Be sure to copy the street pole number from the small metal tag on the pole. The county will send street light maintenance contractors to replace the burnt out bulbs within 72 hours.

Speaking of spring, there are several days set aside in the county for spring cleanup. That includes cleanup in the neighborhood parks in late March and April. This year the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and Cub Scouts will participate in those efforts as they have in the past. We'll have more information on cleanup activities next month. The first date of planned cleanups is the Potomac Watershed cleanup (March 31st, April 1st). This year, we are planning to coordinate RCA community spring cleanup activities with the Scouts. Several boys in Troop 1083 are working toward their Eagle Scout service project. I will encourage them to lead a spring cleanup effort within a park inside of the RCA boundaries. Of course, community help is always welcomed and it gives all of us a chance to get out and improve our neighborhood. Please look for any announcements in the *Echo* on these projects.

Did you know that buying your annual Sam's Club membership from the RCA at \$35 is \$5 less than the usual \$40 Sam's charges mere mortals? Yep, you save \$5, \*and\* because RCA/Sam's are \*business\* memberships, you have the advantage of greater shopping hours six days a week. This is but \*one\* reason to join your neighborhood association.

But on a personal note, after 10+ years of managing this program, I'm looking for my replacement. Here's what's involved:

- 1) Renewing RCA/Sam's memberships;

# Franklin Park Sign Update

During the 2006-07 RCA Membership Drive that started last September, RCA residents donated \$487 towards replacing the Franklin Park sign at the corner of Randolph Road and Hunters Lane. The RCA also provides \$600 towards each sign as part of its neighborhood sign program.

There was interest in looking at different sign designs other than the usual wood signs you see around RCA-land, e.g., Boiling Brook Parkway off Nicholson Lane. On the RCA website (www.randolphcivic.org) is a sign design proposed by Patrick Signs. The proposal is contained in a PDF file that, when you click on it, changes the picture of the current sign to the proposed sign. Kinda cool in itself! The sign itself costs \$1670, not including the two brick columns, so another \$583 is needed just to buy the sign (\$1670-\$487-\$600).

This money might be donated, or lent, but what's really needed is some interest in this project. We need:

- 1) A volunteer to guide the project;
- 2) Someone in the neighborhood who may be willing to build the brick columns, or a plan to have the work otherwise paid for.

If no one comes forward to guide this project, a wooden sign similar to the one on Boiling Brook Parkway will be installed, with donations received so far going towards embellishment to the new wooden one, such as a brick planter. The Franklin Park sign will be discussed at the March 1 general meeting.


# Minutes of the RCA Executive Committee

February 1, 2007

President Mike Saunders presided over an informal meeting to discuss issues important to your neighborhood. Vice-president George Gadbois reported that new street lights have been installed in the Section II area of Randolph Hills (e.g., Topping Road) and also in Franklin Park. This was good news to Matt Shore, who as RCA President spearheaded this effort (see RCA meeting notes of April, 2003). The RCA did get many new streetlights installed, and submitted an expanded 'final list.' County representative Mike Crisin told the RCA our final list of light installations would be delayed due to lack of funding. Mike also told the RCA that we were good at wrangling county services (that's why you elected us!).

Long-time RCA'er Frank Shore watched as some of these streetlights were installed. It's an efficiency marvel, taking workers only 45 minutes to install these streetlights. You can identify the new lights, because the arm stretching over the street is longer. We need your help in calling in burnt-out streetlights (240-777-2190). Write down the street pole number, printed on a small metal tag attached to the pole. County contractors will replace the burnt out bulbs within 72 hours. Good job keeping up RCA-land!

The discussion turned to our nearby parks, and woodland cleanup. Frank reported that Park and Planning workers did a great job of cleaning up Waverly-Schuylkill Park, located at the back of Randolph Hills, leading into Rock Creek Park and Beach Drive (note: the RCA was a driving force in creating this new park). Recently, Park and Planning used major equipment to tear down a shack and haul away several tons of junk in four dump truck-loads. You can see the improvement for yourself by walking through Waverly-Schuylkill Park to the Garrett Park Train Station. An arborist reported that our Park is "an upland forest in a healing process." Frank said more light cleanup is needed, like cutting down the kudzu. In the past, we have chosen spring-cleaning projects, rented equipment, and RCA volunteers have cleaned our woodlands, including Waverly-Schuylkill Park, Randolph Hills Local Park, and Boiling Brook Creek under the auspices of Earth Day (April 22) or Montgomery County clean-up day. Every year our Boy Scouts participate in the Potomac Watershed cleanup (March 31st, April 1st). The action plan is that RCA will coordinate a spring cleanup, maybe coordinating with the Boy Scouts.

Secretary Kevin Kline reported on nearby zoning issues, and asked the Execs to approve an RCA application for an Adopt-a-Road sign. If County approved, the RCA would have to clean a 1/2 mile of Randolph Road of roadside trash, from Hunters Lane to Rock Creek. In return, the County will install two street signs with the Randolph Civic Association's name on them. This is the RCA's second application.

This spring we will install two RCA red wooden signs we have already had made. The Montrose Park sign is in storage. The Randolph Farms sign is temporarily mounted on RCA Secretary Kline's fence, on Randolph Road. Kline's house is located in Randolph Farms. We have not installed these signs because the Execs like to coordinate with nearby homeowners to get their approval. RCA President Mike Saunders noted that, while nearby neighbor's cooperation is desirable, we do not need their approval. RCA signs are installed on County right-of-way, and have the needed permits (note: rental and for-sale signs on the County right-of-way are illegal).

Franklin Park also needs a new sign, and we will revive the Sign Committee of Franklin Park residents that was spearheading this effort. Finally, passed by majority voice-vote: the meeting minutes as published in the November *Echo*. ■

#### Treasurer's Report by Dell Pillers/Cline

As of February 2, 2007, the balance in the RCA checking account was \$7,570.33.

Inflows for the two month period totaled \$191. Expenses totaled \$1,372.76. Check # 1005 is missing from the register below because it is earmarked for the last of the Sam's Club renewals but has not been written yet.

According to our membership chair, John Kehoe, 517 households have paid their membership dues this fiscal year. \$487.00 of the funds in the checking account are contributions designated for the Franklin Park sign. ■

Caller feels sorry for anyone who lives there or wants to sell their house. Please do something about it.

Anonymous from the 11600 block of Ashley Drive. Caller reports that earlier this evening at approximately 7:30 pm, as caller was sitting in caller's car, caller was approached by a suspicious male. Caller is safe, but wants to remind our neighbors to be vigilant and be safe. Thank you.

2007-02-03 (Sat) 6:08 pm Anonymous. This is in reference to the anonymous caller on Ashley Drive on 2006-12-04 concerning the commercial vehicles parked at 120xx Ashley for the last month and a half. When you call the police, tell them that you would like those vehicles ticketed under county code 31-14 [no commercial vehicles may be parked on residential streets unless conducting official business]. There was a truck parked at 1180x Ashley Drive. Caller called the police about eight or nine times. The police eventually did respond after the ninth call when caller quoted 31-14, and ticketed the vehicle for \$250. The vehicle continued to be parked there, and the fine was doubled to \$500. On the third

time, owner was threatened with towing, and the vehicle has been removed from the neighborhood. # Montrose Parkway Update

If you've driven on Montrose \*Road\* close to I-270 in the past six months, you can't miss the construction of Montrose \*Parkway\*, on the south side of the road. This is known as Montrose Parkway \*West\*, as opposed to Montrose Parkway \*East\*. What's the difference? Plenty. \*West\* runs from Montrose Road at Tildenwood Drive (approximately) to Rockville Pike (close to it) and is clearly under construction. It is expected to be complete by Fall, 2008 (it looks like it could open this summer!). \*East\* runs from Parklawn Drive to Veirs Mill Road, and is

only in the planning stages. No funding has been provided for construction.

These two sections actually do not meet, so what's missing? The new Rockville Pike / Montrose Road / Randolph Road Interchange! This is a Maryland State road project, not a County project. Confusing, yes? Here's the Maryland website about it:

The website says construction of this project will begin this year, 2007.

While \*West\* is a done deal, it is possible that the \*East\* portion might not be built, even though planning for it is well underway. This is my reading of the politics, not the

science. Since the newly-elected County Council is decidedly less progrowth and less pro-road than the previous Council of eight years, this Council may decide not to appropriate any funding to \*construct\* the eastern Parkway, even if the \*planning\* for it were complete.

Now the RCA is on record as \*supporting\* Montrose Parkway. It will provide for us an easier path to I-270, just as the neighborhoods around Montrose Road have had for decades. I suppose half a loaf is better than none, but we will wait longer in traffic without the eastern portion. ■

# Wheaton High School Gets AP Recognition

#### Vandalism at Loiederman MS

During the weekend of December 8-10, several students entered the A. Mario Loiederman Middle School property, and at some point began breaking out window and door glass in the rear of the school. As it turns out, some of the students were Loiederman students, others were from other schools. Reportedly, school officials, security and police were called to the school for increasing episodes of this Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings of that weekend. All participants in this series of events have been caught and have received disciplinary action from MCPS. The matter is under police investigation and will likely result in, at least, the affected families splitting the restitution of \$4,000 in repair costs. Loiederman, as a school, will not be burdened with these costs; MCPS will facilitate repairs and coordinate with the courts for repayment without affecting Loiederman. By all accounts, the vandals did not enter the building and as a result, nothing was taken and only a few small items were damaged. MCPS maintenance staff was able to have the building appropriately secured with plywood to avoid any class cancellation the following Monday. It was determined afterwards that lighting in the rear of the school was not satisfactory and has since been upgraded. Loiederman is on a list, among other middle schools, to receive security cameras in the near future.

## **Progress on Parkland MS Modernization**

According to MCPS, the modernization work being performed on Parkland is on schedule, and plans for reopening for the Fall 2007 school year are on track. The current schedule even has some built-in "punch-out" time before the start of school, to minimize disruption once classes begin. Students moving back from the Tilden holding facility, where they have been for the last two years, will enjoy a fully air-conditioned building with centralized wiring and networking for computers, phones, TV and PA in nearly every room. The entranceway has been reconfigured to force visitors by the main office prior to proceeding elsewhere in the building. There will be special accommodations for the aerospace theme such as four additional labs, including one for robotics. Parkland

will be one of the first County middle schools outfitted with school-wide security cameras. (Loiederman reportedly will follow soon after.) Adequate exterior lighting will also be installed about the entire building perimeter for security.


