I'm Doing It For The Money

Note that the headline said "The" money – not "your" money, or even "more" money. I'm doing it for "The" money that will become immediately available to us, the residents within Randolph Civic Association boundaries, if our residents vote to become a municipality of Montgomery County. And this isn't through increased taxes.

I introduced this idea in the September ECHO, page 8, left column, second paragraph. This ECHO, along with several others, is available online through the RCA's website *randolphcivic.org*. The online ECHO is the same as the paper copy distributed to each home.

This issue was discussed at the October 5th General Meeting of the RCA. Many attendees had questions about this idea and wanted to learn more about it before making a decision to support the idea or not. I cannot answer all the questions in this article, but hopefully the following will help.

There is a statute in Maryland State law that returns to municipalities, such as Rockville, Garrett Park, Washington Grove, Brookville, etc, 8.5% of their State income taxes to the local governing body. For example, for every \$1000 paid in Maryland income taxes, the local government receives \$85. That is where these towns get a large portion of their funding. The rest of Montgomery County, those portions that are not incorporated such as Wheaton, Silver Spring, and North Bethesda, get zero. On the face of it,

Do you strongly disagree with any of the programs above? We love the controversy. If people are arguing, they're engaged.

Like giving up a weeknight evening to hear a bunch of neighbors gripe? Okay, sometimes that's what happens at our meetings. It can be tedious unless they're griping about something that concerns you. We had about 40 people at the October meeting. I'm sure it helped to have our newly elected County Council Member attend. But I also think the group enjoyed hearing these interesting and provocative issues explained. Most people agreed with our positions, we tried to make sure we heard from those who didn't. My take from Mr. Denis's comments was that the Council wagon is carrying a lot of baggage and it's going to take a very squeaky wheel to get any attention.

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Minutes of the RCA October General Meeting

President Jack Stillwell opened the meeting by acknowledging the very large turnout. Because of our special guest speaker and the many items that needed to be discussed, Jack had a prepared agenda and planned to keep things moving along.

Treasurer Richard Zierdt introduced our guest speaker, County Councilman Howard Denis, a former Maryland State Delegate who served in Annapolis with retired RCA'er Frank Shore. Over the next hour Mr. Denis spoke extemporaneously, addressing our list of concerns, and then took questions. He noted he is on two committees, including Zoning and Finance (both are important to the RCA).

Turning to the recent press regarding the County's lax drunk driving laws, he thought it was a disgrace, and has told prosecutors and judges that. Maryland is one of the few states with a .10 limit; most others are .08.

Mr. Denis noted half of all the County's operating budget goes to education, typical in local government. The County has 189 school buildings, requiring a huge maintenance investment. Mr. Denis was asked if he would help us in getting our school boundaries changed. He said that was a School Board issue, and he did not want to politicize their process, but encouraged us in our efforts.

Turning to transportation, Mr. Denis emphasized there is a regional component to everything the County does. He noted 90% of the ICC would be paid for with federal funds.

President Stillwell opened the floor to questions, and was moderator.

An RCA'er said she thought the ICC was already dead. She thought building new roads was not the solution, that the environmental impact was too negative. Mr. Denis said we must be creative, because the County is reaching the traffic "tipping point."

Another speaker noted the RCA voted in favor of the Montrose Parkway after much debate, though other civics along Montrose were in violent opposition. He resented that since the ICC has been stopped, the Montrose Parkway is becoming the de facto ICC. Mr. Denis responded the County is buying ICC right-of-way at a cost of \$36 million, that 70% of the people surveyed support the ICC.

President Stillwell spoke of our disappointment with the lack of police response to code enforcement. The laws are on the books regarding illegal parking and blocking sidewalks, but the police will not ticket and enforce the law. Mr. Denis said to call, and he personally would intervene. Mr. Denis's hour was nearly up, and President Stillwell quickly turned to the Millard property problem discussed in the last newsletter. Jack wanted Mr. Denis's support in persuading the County to purchase the land between Garrett Park and RCA-land, and keep it as undeveloped parkland. Mr. Denis was recently at a Garrett Park meeting, and they are also upset about the possibility. He said Park and Planning should review it and present to the County Council. He was amiable to purchasing the property for parkland.

Mr. Dennis was asked if he would support the RCA becoming a municipality. He said if RCA'ers voted for it, he would support us. Our time was up and he was given a round of applause as he left.

Next on the agenda, Treasurer Zierdt gave a presentation of how the RCA could become a municipality. At President's Stillwell's urging, this important decision was tabled until the RCA membership became better informed. Passed by unanimous voice-vote: The RCA Executives explore the possibility of becoming a municipality.

The President briefed the membership on a School Consortium meeting he attended, and explained the issue. Marilyn Couture, an RCA'er active in the PTSA, explained this is the next best thing to getting our kids in the Walter Johnson cluster. Passed by unanimous voicevote: To support the Wheaton High School joining the Down-county Consortium while continuing to change the school boundaries so all of RCA-land is in the Walter Johnson Cluster.

Briefly, the "Renew Montgomery County" program was explained. It involves planting trees throughout the neighborhood, street light improvements, and traffic calming measures.

The Millard property was discussed. There was some concern about the RCA opposing an owner from developing his land. Passed by majority voice-vote: To support efforts for the County to purchase the Millard property, and add it to the Waverly-Schuylkill Park.

Doug Basher of Rockinghorse Road reports excessive traffic on his street and has taken action. Doug contacted County Transportation and has received regulations about traffic volume and how we could get restricted usage implemented in our neighborhood ("No Through Traffic 7 - 9 AM", etc). **Passed by unanimous voice-vote: To support restricted traffic use on Rockinghorse Road.**

this is an inequity to those residents who live outside an incorporated town. However, when this issue was brought before the Montgomery County Civic Federation, of which the RCA is a member, it went nowhere. There was no support to change the current system of funding.

So if you can't beat 'em, join 'em. I'm asking that the RCA endorse the concept of starting the "Town of Randolph" (name is open to discussion). This would provide us funding for community picnics, regular professional landscaping, etc; anything that would improve our neighborhood. Use your imagination. We could buy equipment such as floor sanders that residents could borrow free of charge to keep their hardwood floors in mint condition. (Most homes in RCA came with hardwood floors.) We could hire a lobbyist to make our case before the County Council and School Board, just as Montgomery County does to argue its cases before the Maryland legislature. We could erect more, and nicer, neighborhood signs. The list is endless.

Municipal incorporation would mean there would be an elected mayor and town council. These persons would be elected at the same time we elect persons for other political office, such as County Council members. Residents at the October 5th meeting asked about taxes. Couldn't our taxes be increased at the local level? Yes, they could be, but only if the mayor and town council voted to do so. And they and the tax could be voted down and out as well. The mayor and council would be our neighbors. We know where they live. We see them at the Safeway. Do you know any County Council members? Do you know County Executive Doug Duncan? By becoming an incorporated town, we would exert much greater control over our own governing. By the way, one town in Chevy Chase actually stopped collecting taxes because they were getting so much money in State revenue.

Much of the information for this idea I received from the Maryland Municipal League, 1212 West Street, Annapolis, 21401. This is a support organization for municipalities of Maryland. It is not a government agency. I talked with its Research Director, James Peck (410-268-5514). He sent me a copy of the League's Municipal Incorporation Handbook. I will try to post it on the RCA's website, but I can't guarantee I'll be successful. If someone would like to volunteer for this, it would be appreciated. Call me if you want a paper copy (301-881-0283).

The Handbook does have a list of "pros-and-cons" to municipal incorporation. I will summarize each below.

Points in favor of incorporation:

- Be able to locally determine the variety and levels of services provided to the community
- Be able to enact local law to meet locally-determined needs
- Makes the local government more accessible, accountable, and responsive to citizen needs and desires because of smaller size and more direct access to local officials
- Returns a portion of income taxes paid to directly benefit community taxpayers because municipal governments receive a portion of the local piggyback income tax receipts
- Creates direct access for the local community to various state shared revenues and state and federal grants
- Fosters a sense of community
- Helps ensure that a community is not split into separate districts during decennial redistricting but is retained within a single district – a protection other communities currently lack
- In the case of homeowners' associations (Gaynor Road townhouses: take note), convert current fees paid to the association into property taxes which are tax-deductible

Drawbacks to incorporation:

- The costs in time and money to incorporate. One study estimated one community's incorporation costs to be as much as \$11,000
- A higher level of taxation would ensue in most cases of incorporation to pay for the costs of new public services
- An added level of government is sometimes seen as unnecessary or duplicative
- With municipal incorporation comes the responsibility to provide desired levels and types of services
- Local service provision gives rise to liability exposure and the risk of litigation for a municipal government and its public officials
- Committed volunteers are needed to serve as public officials on various municipal boards and commissions
- Economies of scale which large county governments enjoy may not be available to smaller communities, e.g., cost of trash collection

My answer to each Drawback is as follows: (1) If the cost to incorporate is prohibitive, then incorporation cannot be pursued. (2) I am not advocating new public services. There will be no higher level of taxation. (3) I am not advocating duplicative services. What I am advocating is necessary for the vitality of our community. (4) I advocate no new services that the State income tax rebate will not cover. (5) The RCA has no liability insurance now. As a municipality, we could afford it. (6) This is an opportunity, not a "drawback." Currently, the RCA has no opportunity for such service, with incorporation, it will. (7) Again, I advocate no new services that we cannot afford ourselves.

There is a proscribed process by which incorporation is achieved. This process does not require RCA approval, but it would be encouraging to get it. I have summarized it below as follows:

- Within 18 months of starting the process, a petition signed by at least 25% of the qualified voters within the proposed boundaries must be completed
- Within 60 days, the County verifies the petition signatures
- Within 90 days after successful verification, and after conducting a public hearing, the petitioners present issues report to County
- Within 45 days, county may review report and submit questions to petitioners
- Within 45 days, petitioners present proposed charter to County
- Within 40-60 days, County passes resolution specifying date for incorporation referendum. If the referendum passes, the Incorporation is complete. If it fails, the Incorporation fails.

Finally, we (the current half-dozen or so regular volunteers who keep this organization going) are getting burned out. To keep the vitality of this community going, we need big-time financial or personal help. If you are reluctant to support the idea of our community becoming a municipality, then at least volunteer to help.

I will introduce a motion at the December 7th General Meeting of the RCA that the RCA support the formation of an incorporated town within the boundaries of the RCA.

The Randolph Civic Foundation

With the membership drive now underway, some residents have asked what the difference is between the Randolph Civic Association (RCA) and the Randolph Civic Foundation (RCF).

The fundamental difference is that the RCA is essentially a political (but not partisan) organization, while the RCF is a non-profit 501(c)3 organization, meaning it is entirely dedicated to "good works." Each organization is its own entity. There is no legal connection between the two. Each has its own tax number and bank account. The leadership of each organization (president, secretary, etc.) may be the same (and usually are), but they need not be.

Dues to the RCA (\$5 per year) are not tax-deductible, while any money given to the RCF is tax-deductible. The RCF may only spend money on "good works" such as beautification, support for youth groups, neighborhood events such as the yard sales we hold twice every year, etc. Any amounts over \$5 you send to the RCA will be passed on to the RCF. That's what the extra "stars" at the bottom of the RCA/RCF membership forms mean. We will publish a list of all members, and their "stars" in the January/February ECHO.

Conceivably, the RCA could spend money to promote a political candidate. It has never done this, but it could. The RCF can never do this, or even endorse a candidate.

While the RCA and RCF are dedicated to improving (y)our neighborhood, the RCF allows you the opportunity to support your neighborhood financially with tax-deductible contributions. That's the reason it was started, in August 1996. So please, to help our neighborhood and your taxes, contribute more than the \$5 RCA membership. Any amount over \$5 goes to the RCF and is tax-deductible.

Peanut Butter Snack Cups (can be frozen)

12 vanilla wafers

1 8-oz. Cool Whip (thawed) & divided

1 cup cold milk

1/2 cup peanut butter

1 3.9-oz. pkg. instant chocolate pudding mix

Place wafers in paper or foil-lined muffin cups. Top each with 1 teaspoon Cool Whip. In mixing bowl, combine milk and peanut butter. Add pudding mix; beat on low speed for 2 minutes. Fold in remaining Cool Whip. Spoon into prepared cups. Cover and freeze. Remove from freezer 10 minutes before serving. 12 servings.

(Can use light Cool Whip, skim milk, reduced fat peanut butter and sugar-free chocolate pudding.)

Root Beer Float Cake

- 1 pkg 18 1/4 oz. White cake mix
- 1 3/4 cup cold root beer, divided
- 1/4 cup vegetable oil
- 2 eggs
- 1 envelope whipped topping mix

In a mixing bowl, combine dry cake mix, 1 1/4 cups root beer, oil and eggs. Beat on low speed 2 minutes. Pour into a greased $13 \times 9 \times 2$ inch baking pan. Bake at 350 for 30-35 minutes. Cool completely.

For topping:

In a mixing bowl, combine the whipped topping mix and remaining root beer. Beat until soft peaks form. Frost cake. Store in refrigerator.

Parmesan Corn on the Cob

1/4 cup butter (melted)

1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese

1/2 teaspoon Italian seasoning

4 ears corn on the cob

1/4 cup water

salt to taste

In a bowl, combine the butter, cheese and Italian seasoning; set aside. Remove husks and silk from corn, place in a shallow microwave-safe dish. Add water. Cover and microwave on high for 10-13 minutes, turning once. Let stand for 5 minutes. Drain. Brush with butter mixture, sprinkle with salt.

Golden Veggie Dip

(encourage the kids to eat their veggies!)

1 8-oz. pkg. cream cheese (softened)

- 1/4-cup steak sauce
- 1 tablespoon chili sauce
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic salt
- 1/2 teaspoon celery salt
- 1/4 teaspoon paprika

In a small bowl, combine all ingredients. Refrigerate until serving. Makes 1 1/2 cups.



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Gardening Tips

Start to bag all lawn clippings. As soil temps drop below 53 degrees, (in mid-November), the grass clippings will not decay until spring (do not add more clippings!).

Nasty unseasoned firewood and mulch are free for the taking from the Bonifant Rd. Landfill in Aspen Hill at 1201 Bonifant Road, open Saturdays, 7 am to 3 pm. Call 301-384-0941.

Clean gutters and downspouts of leaves and debris. Shut off all inside cutoff valves to your outside water spigots. Open the outside spigot to drain the remaining water left in the waterline to prevent freezing and bursting.

Plant spring bulbs now. Just before Thanksgiving, stores will discount their remaining stocks of trees, shrubs, and spring bulbs at tremendous savings to make space for the more lucrative Christmas trees. Fall is the best time to plant most shrubs and trees, though everyone prefers to buy and plant in the spring.

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- 2. The technician determines if the dirt and mold in the duct work is caked on.
- 3. High pressure compressed air is injected into each vent, this air blast pushes the dirt and duct down into the main duct run.
- 4. After the vents are blown down we take a small tool call the aire sweep and insert it in the main duct runs. The aire sweep moves down the duct run each time air pressure is applied. This action sweeps grime, dirt and dust back to the vacuum hose hookup and into the portable vacuum system.
- 5. We then air wash the fan blower compartment, plenum, air handling side of the furnace and the a/c coil with air pressure and vacuum.

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Neighborhood Notes

Light Pollution

Suburban planners are becoming aware of increased resistance to excessive lighting at night. "Light trespass," caused by badly directed nightlights, is becoming a neighbor-to-neighbor issue. People do not want lights glaring at them when they sleep.

Fairfax County is working on language that would limit the amount of light thrown off by commercial buildings and homes. Fauquier County supervisors last year passed one of the strictest lighting ordinances in the state, spurred in part by lighting at a local gas station that one supervisor described as a "helicopter landing pad."

Maryland State Delegate Nancy K. Kopp (D-Montgomery) is preparing to introduce measures that would affect lighting levels. She said "This is a matter of concern for reasonable people. This is not something kooky."

Crackdown on Street Vendors

A new law allows law enforcement officials to confiscate food, flowers, crafts, and other goods from unlicensed vendors along highways and median strips. Edward Calloway, the County's Investigator for the vendor program, says "It seems like we've had a group of vendors that stand in the median strip selling flowers. We tried an educational approach, but it didn't work. They kept coming back and coming back." If you see vendors selling from the median strip, call Calloway at 240-777-6253 or 310-370-3649.

Critical Randolph Road Crash

An August 28th collision in the 2800 block of Randolph Road raises concerns of excessive speeding. Victoriana Kharman, 51, was pulling out of her driveway onto Randolph at 5:50 pm when two cars struck her car simultaneously. Witnesses told Montgomery County Police that the two male drivers "Took off in a speed contest, side-by-side...It was not a road rage incident." The Police Collision Reconstruction Unit determined the two cars were traveling between 60 and 90 m.p.h., where the speed limit is 35 mph!

Officer Derek Baliles said the Police conduct speed enforcement on Randolph Rd. on a daily basis. He said 250 to 300 tickets are issued each month along Randolph Rd.

Wheaton High School

Hello fellow RCA'ers. My name is Marilyn Couture. I am a Randolph Hills resident and the Wheaton High School PTSA Treasurer. I hear and read a lot of things about Wheaton, at the RCA meetings, via email, and in the newspapers. I know that many RCA residents are in favor of having the school boundaries changed to have all our kids in the same cluster and I'm in full agreement with that because it does make sense. Unfortunately, it's probably not going to happen too soon, and as a mother of two Wheaton students, I feel the need to interject some positive aspects about the school. Henceforth this article. I volunteered (one of my weaker moments!) to contribute articles to the ECHO, be they large or small, most likely small, just to let you residents know that there are people aware of the problems facing Wheaton and they are trying to correct them.

One of the problems is the overcrowding. Renovations have started to add 18 classrooms and other core improvements to alleviate overcrowding and make the atmosphere of the school more conducive to learning. These renovations are scheduled to be completed by August 2001.

Of course the biggest problem is the low test scores. Dr. Frank Critton, Wheaton's principal for the last two years, and his staff are working hard to correct this problem. Through the Federal Comprehensive School Reform program, Wheaton has received monies via a Challenge Grant from the State. These monies are used for specific programs targeted in the Grant. They are based on a model called High Schools That Work used by the Southern Regional Education Board (www.sreb.org). Some of the Wheaton teachers, staff and parents have attended workshops through this program to improve teaching skills and implement programs to assist students in learning. Some programs that have been instituted this school year are the after school Homework Center, the after school Science Tutorial and the Saturday Academy. Other programs offered at the school are the National Honor Society Tutoring, After School Computer Labs, Math Tutorial Program, RAP (Reaching Academic Potential), an after school tutorial aimed at 9th graders who are failing certain subjects, the Shadowing Program and evening guidance hours for parents. Last year the

KnightLine, a newsletter for 9th grade parents to promote parental awareness and involvement, was implemented. Dr. Critton's theme for the school is R.E.A.C.H. which stands for Responsibility, Enthusiasm, Achievement, Cooperation and Harmony. To learn more about these programs, call the school at 301-929-2050.

So as you can see, there are some good things going on at Wheaton. If you have a child that is currently attending Wheaton or will be, and would like to learn more about the school, please join us at our PTSA meetings that are held every third Tuesday of the month at 7:00 in the Media Center at the school.
