Minutes of the RCA General Meeting

October 4, 2001

Boy Scout Troop 1083 presented an Honor Guard, and we all said the Pledge of Allegiance with gusto. The Scouts were given a round of applause as thanks.

The RCA had several guest speakers. RCA Park Committee Chairman Frank Rossomondo introduced the three representatives of the Maryland National Capital Park and Planning Commission (MNCPPC): Carolyn Wainwright from the permitting office; Peter Boettinger, the park manager for this area; and Park Police Cpl. Mary Carlin.

Frank explained that our guests were here to discuss RCA concerns of the large unsupervised soccer crowds in Randolph Hills Local Park (RHLP). Frank gave some background, that the soccer field is really an "all purpose field," not a soccer field (later, Peter agreed, and suggested the permanent soccer goals could be removed to return the field to "all-purpose"). Earlier, Frank and MNCPPC representatives met at the soccer field, and Frank pointed out beer and liquor bottles, and where players change clothes and urinate in the bushes, etc. Almost all of the soccer players are from out of this area, with DC and Virginia tags. Frank focused on ways of controlling and monitoring this soccer activity. Kevin Kline emphasized that, because our park is designated a "local park" that it belongs primarily to the surrounding community - that's RCA-land.

Frank then turned the floor over to Carolyn Wainwright. Carolyn spoke at length on how our park was so good that everyone wanted to use it. She explained the various park designations: Regional Parks, Valley Stream Parks, Local Parks, etc. Carolyn said that, perhaps at one time a local park meant just that but that "it was an old term, and today it means something very much different." She discussed the 75-year history of the park, how we are in the mist of evolutionary change, the challenges of upcounty parks, and how the pressure is even greater for downcounty parks like ours.

Carolyn said Montgomery downcounty was changing from suburban to urban, and becoming less white and more culturally diverse. Other cultures spend the entire day at the park, not like the typical "soccer moms" we are used to.

As the hour dedicated to this issue was up, RCA President Kevin Kline interjected with community concerns. Firstly, Kevin respectfully disputed the contention that this was a cultural problem, of an older white community clashing with younger Latinos. Secondly, he reiterated that the MNCPPC's own Capital Budget clearly states that "local parks" are indeed for the local surrounding neighborhood. Kevin hoped this was not just

"old terminology" as Carolyn had suggested, because we believe the Randolph Hills park is our park.

Momentarily, Kevin and Carolyn had a semantic debate over what "local" means.

Kevin returned to his central point: that the Park representatives, through their permitting offices, are attracting large groups of park users to our park. If they do not know large groups are in the park, they should. These large groups of park users need monitoring, trash cans, toilets, and all these needs should be coordinated by the Park representatives themselves. Instead, we the community have to call the police, check on trash, report violations, etc.

Park reps responded with some good answers – that there is coordination, that the Park Police know when large permitted groups are to be in the park, etc. Several suggestions were discussed, and Passed by majority voice vote: That RCA request the MNCPPC to limit use of the soccer field to permit holders only, and that the permits be restricted for use by youth (up to 18 years) only. Failed by a tie vote: That RCA request the MNCPPC to remove the permanent soccer goalposts.

Park Police Officer Polk is newly assigned to our area, and he revealed that during the upcoming weekend he would be strictly enforcing speeding and park regula-

tions in our park and in the surrounding Rock Creek. All the Police and park officials were given a round of applause for meeting with us.

The RCA President introduced Loehmann's Plaza representative Grant Ehat. Loehmann's Plaza Shopping Center has secured Chuck E. Cheese restaurant as a potential tenant in the space vacated by Rite-Aid Pharmacy. Loehmann's Plaza has requested a parking waiver regarding the number of parking spaces required under the County's Zoning Ordinance to serve a restaurant. Grant said that a Chuck E. is "theme" restaurant catering to children and families, and does not draw the same volume of vehicles, nor do they need as much parking, as conventional restaurants.

After a short presentation, Passed by unanimous voice-vote: to support Loehmann's Plaza's parking waiver request, with the caveat that the waiver should be granted for the Chuck E. Cheese restaurant only. This parking waiver should expire if Chuck E. Cheese vacates Loehmann's Plaza.

The RCA President briefly explained how anyone can download from the internet a Sexual Offenders list.

Kevin wanted to discover if any sexual deviants were in RCA-land. Much to his surprise, the list is 10 pages long, and the perverts are all around us! To avoid privacy issues, we will only say there are sexual offenders that live or work on RCA-land's Wyaconda Drive; on Parklawn; two at the Nebel criminal pre-release center; two on Wilkens Ave. (off Parklawn); one on Randolph near Veirs Mill; on Nicholson; two on Old Georgetown Road; several in Rockville; in Kensington; and in Wheaton! Do not call the RCA for specifics. Instead, find out for yourself at www.emontgomery.org/police.

RCA director George Gadbois said that generally, the County is proceeding with RCA-land sidewalk repair per their most recent schedule in completing the first section this season. However, some of the work is unsatisfactory. Evidence of crooked formwork, inadequate thickness and overall sloppy workmanship was presented by various RCAers. If you don't like what you see, leave your name & number on the RCA hotline at 301-881-2722, and he'll coordinate our complaints. If you pay for work done on the county strip (i.e. aprons, lead walks) and are dissatisfied with the quality, you should both leave a hotline message AND contact the County directly with your complaint (the phone number is on the contract you signed). We hope the quality of work improves.

As of October 7, 2001, combined RCA+RCF cash assets total \$3,865.86. Membership and SAMs income of \$6,780.34 to October 2 has not been deposited yet, which will then yield \$10,646.20 in assets. Of this, approximately \$2,500 must be paid for SAMs memberships. Also, seven issues of the ECHO must be paid, about \$7,000. Additional membership income is expected, but so far, it looks like a typical RCA/RCF fiscal year.



corner of Ashley and Boiling Brook (brush, trash, etc). (2) Even though the police choose not to respond to calls about cars blocking sidewalks, it would be wise to consider that nowhere in this country is sidewalk parking permissible. Sidewalks are for walking, not parking. Blocking sidewalks gives rise to accidents and inconveniences to disabled, children, etc. Also, it speaks to the consideration that one resident has toward another in the neighborhood. (3) Offers a suggestion to the caller who called asking about a neighbor who complains all the time: a self-check. Is the caller being a good community neighbor? That implies being even more than a neighbor. Are you doing things that pollute the environment; that perhaps cause great inconvenience and perhaps hardship for the people with whom you live (outside of your house)? Are you conducting a business that would not be permitted? Look to yourself first. Reach out and respond to people first. It would be nice to act as a community of neighbors. It would be wonderful to have an association take a more active enforcement role to step up to someone's door and inform them of a problem. Residents with multiple cars are a problem. Remember how precious

life is, particularly in this time, and to be good to one another.

When it comes to trash pickup, some holidays are honored by the County, but some are not. When they are honored, trash pickup day is on Tuesday that week. The trouble is knowing which holidays change trash pickup dates.

Here's the answer, or at least where the answer can be found, as provided by Susanne Brunhart Wiggins, Public Outreach Specialist with Montgomery County Division of Solid Waste Services:

The text at the top of this page lists the affected holidays generically, and describes the 'holiday slide' process. A graphic towards the bottom of the page depicts the specific dates for 2001. Towards the end of this calendar year, that information will be updated to reflect the 2002 dates. I [also] invite your readers to sign up for our Holiday Reminder e-mail service, and the registration for this takes place via the URL above. One week prior to a given holiday, this e-mail message announces whether or not that upcoming date is a recycling and trash holiday."

Receive Montgomery County Legislative Notices Online

The Montgomery County Delegation to the Maryland General Assembly maintains a web site, www.montgomerycountydelegation.com, that keeps information about state legislation directly affecting Montgomery and Prince Georges Counties. This is the legislative season, and many additions and updates will be posted in the coming weeks. This is great, but who wants to check the site daily for updates?

No problem, since the Delegation Administrator, Susan Gottschalk, will e-mail you a short message when something new is posted. Just send her a note that you want to be included in the list of those who receive update notices. Ms. Gottschalk's email is Moc2@mlis.state.md.us. The Moc2 stands for "MOntgomery County #2."



The History of RCA-land

uring the US Civil War, your house was located near the seat of the Federal Government, and just across the Potomac from the Confederacy.

In the June/July/August *Echo* we reported that on **Wednesday**, **September 10**, **1862** the Confederate Army of Virginia invaded Maryland, and Rockville is now the base for the Union Army of the Potomac. The streets are wild with excitement, and teeming with soldiers and mule-drawn wagon trains. Calvary are thundering down the roads in all directions. Today there were reports of skirmishes near Darnestown, around the old George C. Washington farm and also at Seneca. The C&O Canal has been cut. The stagecoach to Frederick has been discontinued.

Tuesday, September 16, 1862. In the most momentous week of RCA-land, there has been fierce fighting all week, from Monocacy Chapel, north along the Potomac river, to Harper's Ferry. The Rockville Courthouse has become a temporary hospital for the sick and slightly wounded Union soldiers. Rockville and the surrounding area (that's your neighborhood) is in disarray with fields and gardens trampled, fences gone, and roads impassable from heavy use.




