# Spring Bulb Sale - Neighborhood Beautification

With this 2005-2006 Membership Drive, we begin a new offer for RCA members: spring bulbs (which are planted in late fall) at wholesale prices. Remember the gorgeous display of tulips and daffodils on Boiling Brook Parkway this past spring? (See picture at www.randolphcivic.org) Those are the bulbs we are offering. Here's how it works:

Order what bulbs you like as listed on your membership form. See picture of the bulbs at www.randolphcivic.org. Do the math and figure your total. Add \$5 for delivery to your door (this goes to Boy Scout Troop 1083 to support its programs). Did you renew your RCA membership? You must join to take advantage of this program. Send in your total to RCA membership chair Carol Brown in the postage-paid envelope provided. Make checks payable to the Randolph Civic Association. Bulbs will be purchased from the wholesaler in early November for delivery to you in mid-November.

The RCA is piloting this program to encourage residents to beautify their yards, and by extension, the whole neighborhood. You will not find bulbs anywhere near the prices offered because these bulbs are purchased wholesale with little or no markup. Again, as with all RCA activities, no one makes any money at this.

Have your yard, and your community, look its absolute best this coming Spring. If this program is at all popular, the RCA will offer summer bulbs at the next membership drive (September 2006) for planting in the spring of 2007. ■

### **SAM's Club Membership News**

(The following Sam's information is also always available on www.randolphcivic.org. Click on "RCA/Sam's Club Membership.")

Again this year, SAM's Club cards are available through the RCA for \$30 per year per household (maximum 2 cards per membership) for RCA members only. These are business memberships, which means you can shop at SAMs during the "business hours" of 7 to 10 AM. "Regular" memberships cannot shop then.

Existing SAM's users: check your expiration date on your RCA membership card. Most expire on or close to November 1, 2005. However, some expire in 2006, so check the date. For these users, do not include the \$30: your SAMs card is good through the date indicated. Otherwise, simply add \$30 to your RCA dues, and continue to use your existing SAMs card. A new card will not be issued.

For residents who want to join SAMs now (new memberships), simply add \$30 to your RCA dues, and include your phone number. I will not purchase SAMs Cards without your phone number! I will purchase new SAMs memberships in late October and give you the account number. Take the membership number to the membership desk of any SAMs Club store the first time you shop, and SAMs will issue you a permanent, plastic card which you will use from then on. Your SAMs membership will run from November 1 through October 30, 2006.

## **Traffic Restrictions Update**

As voted at the May, 2005 RCA General Membership meeting, the RCA decided to pursue morning traffic restrictions on southbound Rocking Horse Road. These restrictions were first developed by RCAer Doug Basher, but are now under review by the County's transportation department, at an apparent glacial pace. The plan was submitted on June 28. It will be some time before the RCA hears back, but we'll check in from time to time.

The RCA will not pursue afternoon traffic restrictions at this time, because they might create undue burdens on RCA residents returning from work. So only morning restrictions will be studied for now.



Friends and family didn't want it, it wasn't in good enough shape for Goodwill or the Housing Opportunities Commission, and so I thought I was going to have to call for a special pickup by the trash folks.

Then I remembered hearing about Freecycle, an online mailing list where people post things they want to get rid of or things they need. A Randolph Hills neighbor used them last year to get rid of 2 sofas, and some other friends picked up enough stones for a nice retaining wall in their backyard. So I posted my dresser on Monday, Wednesday it was claimed, and Saturday it was out of my house. Neat, quick, and painless.

According to their website, Freecycle is a free network of local community mailing lists and "is open to all who want to 'recycle' that special something rather than throw it away. Whether it's a chair, fax machine, piano or old door, feel free to post it. Our membership includes individuals, and nonprofit organizations, too! One constraint: everything posted must be free, legal and appropriate for all ages." The only other restriction is all messages must have the appropriate Subject header – Offer, Taken (when your offer is claimed), Wanted, or Received (when your wish is fulfilled).

You join the community for your neighborhood, which for us is the newer FreecycleRockville instead of FreecycleDC (http://groups.yahoo.com/group/FreecycleRockville/). Since the network operates through Yahoo! Groups, you will need to sign up for a free Yahoo mail account, but you can do that right from the webpage. Then, just sit back and watch the many messages come through with offers for party goods, drywall, furniture, old electronics, or requests for living room furniture, plants, baby clothes, and many other things. I've been amazed at what people are offering, but it is also a great feeling to know that your extras are going to someone else who can use them instead of off to the dump. So, stop dumping. Start Freecycling!
