Neighborhood News Update

Here are a few quick updates on things happening in or around RCA land:

Randolph Hill Shopping Center Construction

The construction in the Randolph Hills Shopping Center is for an Electric Vehicle Charging Station (a rechargery). The company is called ionna. There will be 12 fast electric car charging stations. They are expected to be available mid-late summer.

Garret Park Bridge Project

MCDOT has again postponed the Garret Park Bridge project. The bridge closure and work is now scheduled for Summer 2027.

Rock Creek Stream Stabilization Project

Construction along the Rock Creek at the corner of Garrett Park Rd and Beach Drive is ongoing. It was scheduled to be finished by April 20, 2026 but as of the printing of this article has yet to be completed.

Ashley Drive Speed Hump Plan

If you are an Ashley Drive or Stoneleigh Court resident you will be receiving a visit from an RCA representative asking you about your approval or disapproval of the MCDOT Speed Hump Plan. The RCA solicited neighborhood feedback through the ECHO, RCA meetings, and through the RCA Listserv. The majority of the responses were in favor of the plan. It is now incumbent upon the RCA to poll 70% of the residents on Ashley Drive. Of those 70% of residents, 51% must be in favor of installing the speed humps. Without Ashley Drive residents' support of the speed hump plan, the speed humps will not be installed.

One of the things I have always loved most about our neighborhood is the beautiful trees, and with the heat of summer on its way, now is the time to think about planting trees!

Studies in Portland, Oregon show that increased tree canopy significantly reduces urban air temperatures, with up to a 25-degree Fahrenheit difference observed between shaded and unshaded neighborhoods during extreme heat events like the 2021 heat dome. Large, connected tree canopies are most effective, while areas with high pavement coverage and low canopy see the highest temperatures.

If you lost a tree recently in a storm or due to old age - our area is on the priority list for Reforest Montgomery to plant trees, this means they will come and plant a tree in your yard FOR FREE.

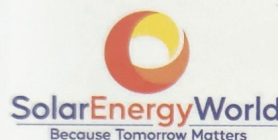

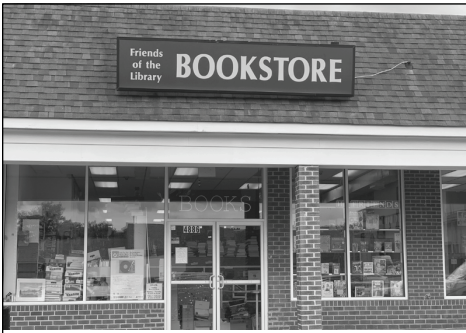

Springtime is a Great Time to Get Ahead of Poison Ivy

Homeowners should remove poison ivy encroaching on public sidewalks to prevent accidental skin contact. The plant's oily resin, urushiol, easily brushes onto pedestrians, pets, or stray items.

Sidewalks are high-traffic zones. Because poison ivy has a creeping vine system, it frequently spills out of landscaping and over lawn edges. Pedestrians, children playing, or individuals walking dogs can easily brush against the leaves or stems without realizing it, triggering an allergic, itchy rash.

The strip of grass between the curb and the sidewalk is considered a public right-of-way, but the maintenance of adjacent property falls on the homeowner. Failing to maintain vegetation that poses a public health hazard can lead to code enforcement violations or even legal liability.

Dogs and cats often dart into the brush or walk close to the edge of the sidewalk. While animals rarely break out in the same painful rashes humans do, their fur collects the urushiol oil. This oil easily transfers to furniture, car interiors, and a pet owner's skin when they pet or groom their animal.

Ignoring poison ivy along the sidewalk guarantees it will spread further into your yard. It spreads both above ground through vine runners and underground

through aggressive root systems (rhizomes). Removing it promptly prevents it from deeply establishing itself into expensive landscaping, fencing, or trees.

To report overgrown poison ivy encroaching on a sidewalk, you should contact the MC311 Customer Service Center by calling 311 (or 240-777-0311).

Election judges needed for June primary election

The county Board of Elections is seeking voters to serve as election judges during early voting, June 11-18, and on primary election day, June 23. The board particularly needs residents who are registered Republicans or Independents.

All workers must be registered Maryland voters who are fluent in English. Also needed are speakers of Spanish, Amharic, Chinese, French, Korean and Vietnamese. Election workers cannot hold public office, be a candidate running for office or act as campaign managers.

Students 16 and older can earn SSL (student service learning) hours.

Spring paving and infrastructure maintenance on county roads

The Montgomery County Department of Transportation (MCDOT) has begun its 2026 spring paving and infrastructure maintenance season.

MCDOT expects to complete 34 roadway maintenance projects and 17 sidewalk repair projects this spring. A preliminary list of road resurfacing projects and sidewalk repair projects is available online. Both sites will be updated throughout paving season as projects are added to the schedule.

You can help. You can make a request online for a needed roadway repair or sidewalk repair, or request an ADA curb ramp.

Check your deck

Beginning on Friday, May 1, Montgomery County homeowners can request a free residential deck maintenance inspection, conducted by the Department of Permitting Services, by calling MC 311 (240-777-0311) or filling out a online service request

for an appointment. The program is limited to 300 appointments.

An inspection generally takes less than 30 minutes. For more information on the permit and inspection process, visit the DPS website.

DPS's free deck inspection program does not extend to the city limits of Gaithersburg and Rockville, as those municipalities have their own permitting departments.

County animal adoption center extends weekend hours

Montgomery County Animal Services and Adoption Center has extended the adoption center hours by one hour -- 11 am-5 pm -- on both Saturdays and Sundays. Previously, weekend adoption hours were noon-5 pm.

Center hours on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday are noon-7 pm. The center is closed on Wednesdays.

April 21, 2026

Maryland to set own vaccine policies

Maryland Gov. Wes Moore last week signed the Maryland Vax Act (HB0637/SB0385), which allows the state to set its own vaccine recommendations rather than following shifting federal policies, effective July 1, 2026. Under the new law, the Maryland Secretary of Health will issue recommendations for certain immunizations, screenings, and preventive services based on certain evidence-based scientific and clinical guidance.

The act requires insurance companies to cover vaccines endorsed at the state level, effective January 1, 2027.

April 23, 2026

\$1.7M in security grants for nonprofits at risk of hate crimes

Montgomery County Executive Marc Elrich and County Council President Natali Fani-González on Monday announced the latest round of security grant awards, \$500,000, of \$2,500 to \$15,000 to each of 96 county-based nonprofits, faith-based organizations and houses of worship at risk for hate bias incidents. Funding to date totals \$1.7 million: \$1.2 million initial allocation and this \$500,000 supplemental appropriation.

In making the grant awards, the county prioritized organizations with limited or no existing security

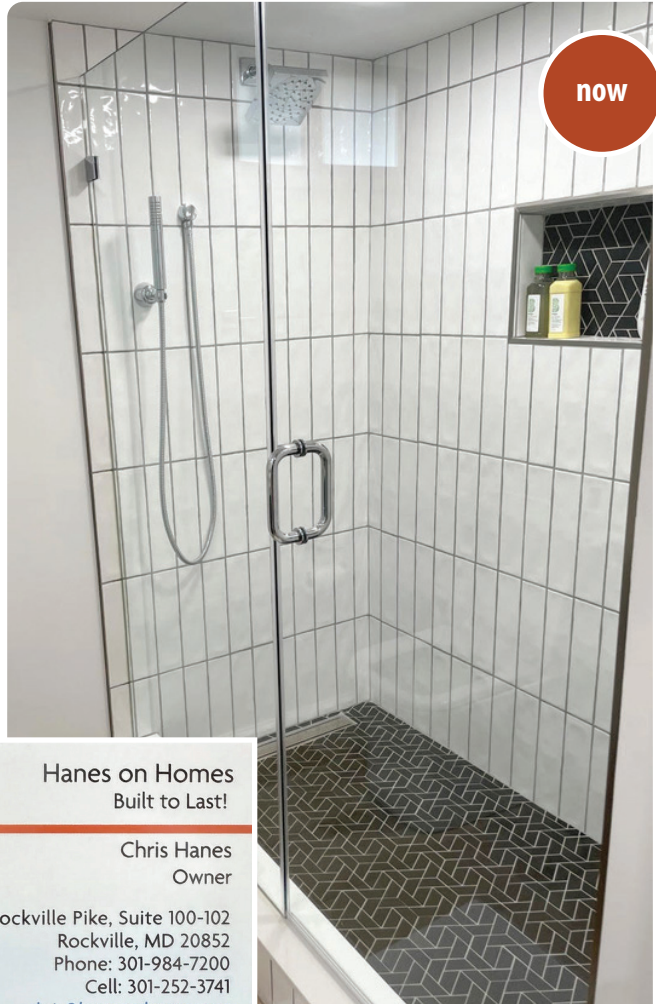

measures, those in “vulnerable location,” and those that already had experienced incidents of hate bias. The latter applied to nearly half the applicants.

April 28, 2026

Council unanimously passes amended Unmask ICE Act

Today, the Montgomery County Council passed expedited bill 5-26, as amended, which prohibits federal, state, and local law enforcement officers from wearing masks or facial coverings, with limited exceptions. It requires identification while on duty in Montgomery County and the creation of an online portal where law enforcement officers or members of the public can report alleged violations.

The bill was amended to be consistent with and complementary to legislation that the state legislature recently passed on this topic, which goes into effect October 1, 2026.

New county food scraps drop-off site

The county now has five food scraps recycling drop-off site, at Pike Central Farm Market in North Bethesda, open Saturdays, 9 am-1 pm, April 25-November 1. The market is at 935 Prose Street, in the parking lot next to Pinstripes.

The other food scraps drop-off sites are at farmers markets in Bethesda, Derwood, downtown Silver Spring and Olney.

No Metro rail or bus fare increases, expanded service

The fiscal year 2027 \$4.8 billion operating and capital budget adopted by the WMATA board of directors last Thursday leaves current rail and bus fares in place.

Rail customers will see increased weekday off-peak service on the Orange, Silver, and Blue lines and additional late-night frequency on the Red Line. Metro bus service improvements on selected routes in DC and Virginia will take place in June. Additional bus and rail changes will be made in December.

The capital budget includes funding for the first steps of rail modernization on the Red Line, Metro’s original line that opened more than 50 years ago.

Bethesda fitness technology company has global reach

Bethesda-based Sworkit, a veteran- and Black-led fitness technology company, has grown into a global wellness platform that is used in more than 15,000

schools worldwide and available in 13 languages.

Sworkit founder Ryan Hanna taught himself to code and built an exercise app that offers a more engaging workout. His app allows users to customize exercise type, length, and instructor's voice.

Recently featured by Google, Sworkit’s success highlights how Montgomery County companies can drive innovation, create jobs, and contribute to inclusive economic growth.

May 5, 2026

County begins crosswalk signal “repair blitz”

The Montgomery County Department of Transportation has launched a countywide initiative to inspect and repair crosswalk pedestrian signals, targeting about 100 intersections in high-traffic areas such as Bethesda, Silver Spring, and Wheaton. The initiative will expand to cover roughly 800 additional county-maintained intersections by the end of the year.

This “repair blitz” is in response to winter weather, including heavy snowfall (“snowcrete”) in January and freezing temperatures that damaged some crosswalk signals and poles.

Do you know of a crosswalk signal that isn’t working properly? Transportation officials encourage residents to report signal issues they encounter by using the county’s 311 system or online portal.

Request for Musical Instrument Donations *by Lorena Moyer, Macon Rd*

Hello! My name is Lorena Moyer and I have lived in Randolph Hills for 22 years. It's a wonderful place to live and we love the schools our kids have attended. We have a Senior at John F. Kennedy High School and an 8th grader (going to Einstein next year) at Loiederman.

I am the President of the Kennedy Music Boosters. We are a group of parents/caregivers who support the choral arts and instrumental music programs at Kennedy. Our mission is to assist the teachers in purchasing music for their classes, purchasing and repairing instruments, and supplementing costs for field trip performances. We also help during football season, concerts, and anywhere else our Choral and Instrumental Music Directors need us.

Our instrumental music program has grown from 25 students in band/orchestra in the 2022-2023 school year to 56 students this school year. We are anticipating an increase in student enrollment in our instrumental ensembles (beginning band, symphonic band, and symphonic orchestra) to approximately 70-90, in the 2026-2027 school year. It is a testament to our Instrumental Music Director's, Ms. Herold, dedication

in rebuilding the program since the pandemic. While this is wonderful news, we have realized we do not have enough instruments for everyone. Some students own their instruments, some borrow them from the school, however, most are unable to rent or purchase their instruments.

We were able to secure a MCPS Educational Foundation grant for \$2,000 which will allow Ms. Herold to purchase 3-4 instruments; however, we will need more. This is where my request comes in. If you have a musical instrument that is no longer being used and in good condition, would you please contact me at moyerle@gmail.com. If an instrument needs some repair, we'll take it. The Music Boosters will assist with getting the instrument repaired.
