## Wheaton High School Re-Modernization Project

On February 7, 2013, the RCA was fortunate to have Kevin Lowndes, the Principal of Wheaton High School, come and speak to the community about the improvements to both the physical school as well as how kids are learning and being taught.

Over the next several years the Wheaton High School / Thomas Edison High School of Technology campus will receive a complete overhaul. It is a total rebuild -- not a renovation. Superintendent Joshua Starr wants Wheaton High School to be the model for all future Mont-

gomery County High Schools. All Montgomery County high school teachers will come to Wheaton High School to get trained.

Wheaton High School is being built as a green school with solar panels and state of the art amenities. The new school will take over the corner of Randolph Road and

Dalewood Drive with the main entrance of the school facing Dalewood Drive. The new school will be able to hold 2,000, but they expect the new population when it opens in 2015 to be 1,650, up from the current population of 1,250. It will be a three floor building with a large courtyard in the middle, a new health center for the community, an auditorium that will have tier seating to hold 1,100 people, an All-Purpose Room that will welcome community events, as



well as interactive and inviting class rooms.

Wheaton High School has a magnet program that started last year, in addition to four academies to attract students to help them be more successful in school. The academies cater towards Engineering, Global and Cultural Studies, Information Technology, and the Biosciences.

The school has a digital arts program and their goal is to teach kids 21st century skills and to prepare them for the workplace. They merge high school and college level classes and are working with the University of Maryland on a college level math course.

Once the new Wheaton High School opens the construction will start on the new school for Edison. Edison will be adding a finance center as well as offering homeland security instruction when it opens in 2017. The total project is slated to be completed in 2018 with new (Continued on page 8)

### Montgomery County Police Department 2nd District Comes to RCA-Land

On February 4th the new Montgomery County Police Districts became effective. This resulted in a shift of the 1st District (Rockville) further north and the 2nd District Bethesda moving north into that space... more or less. The map on page seven shows the new districts and as you can see, RCA-land has now been split into 2 districts separated by Randolph Road. Montrose Park and Franklin Park remain in District 1. What does this mean? Residents will not likely see much of a change according to both Community Liaison Officers for the 1st and 2nd Districts as first responders to issues could come from either District. All emergency and non-emergency numbers remain the same. The beat officers will change as well as the community liaison officers, but overall residents will not likely notice the difference unless they interact regularly with the beat officers. According to the announcement by MCPD the new Districts were needed because of:

- A need to improve service to residents with a more balanced workload between police districts,
- The new location of the Public Safety Headquarters to 100 Edison Park Drive in Gaithersburg,
- The future re-location of the 1st District station to the Public Safety Headquarters in Gaithersburg, and
  - A need to improve officer safety.


So, for now we have reached out to the new community liaison officer and will continue to work with the officer from the 1st District. It does seem like RCA-land is a favorite trading card amongst MoCo government agencies; we'll just have to wait and see if any of the new districts will result in better or worse service for the residents that live here. The other middle schools the children can attend are A. Mario Loiderman and Argyle; the high schools are Einstein, Kennedy, Blair and Northwood. 

### **Neighbor Noise Solutions**

One of the more common issues we deal with in our community is noise complaints, most often from late night parties. These kinds of annoyances can be frustrating, as they greatly impact our quality of life and are difficult to stop or prevent. We get calls about such parties throughout the year, but much to our frustration we have found there is little that we as a Civic Association can do about them. We can however provide you with the tools you need to deal with the problem.

The first thing you should consider is whether it is possible to stop the parties simply by approaching the offending party and explaining how their behavior is having a negative effect on their neighbors. I encourage a sort of "charm offensive". Be friendly, bring some kind of goodwill gift, and in making your case approach it with the assumption that they don't realize that their behavior is causing a problem.

If this is not an option for you, or if you have already tried the friendly approach and been rebuffed, your next option is to join the Neighborhood Watch. If there is a house which throws parties on a regular basis, the Watch can plan a regular drive-by of the party house and place calls to the police when an infraction is witnessed. However, be aware that you will need to take an active role and lead the effort.

If the Neighborhood Watch is not an option for you, then you have one other path to pursue. It starts with always calling the police and getting a police report number every time there is an incident. I say that it "starts" with calling the police because calling them will probably not solve the problem in and of itself. We have had recent incidents where police pull up to the offending house, but if the officer doesn't hear anything from the car he/she will then drive away. Police officers cannot issue citations for disturbances if they don't witness them. So, what you are really doing is officially documenting a pattern of misbehavior which will help your effort down the road.

Getting resolution this way will require commitment on your part. Since it is often difficult to create a situation where a police officer will witness the noise disturbance, the county has a provision allowing residents to file a "Citizen's Two-Party Noise Complaint" which can be found at: http://www2.montgomerycountymd.gov/DE-POnlineForms/NoiseComplaintForm.aspx.

As long as you can find one other neighbor who will team up with you, you can file this kind of complaint to initiate enforcement action from the county. In this situation, you may be asked to testify in court, so make sure you are prepared for that possibility before you submit the form!

While there are undoubtedly situations where this last measure is unavoidable, please do consider whether the charm offensive might not ultimately be the most effective route. In the past six years of serving as

RCA Environment Chair, I have found that the aggressive action described above usually has the effect of causing the offending party to feel like the victim. Once you have made them the victim, you are likely to start a battle that can go on for years and get very ugly. Even though you may be completely in the right to complain about them, you have created a situation where they will perceive you as an unreasonable aggressor, and themselves as the injured party!

So, what I recommend is that before embarking on an aggressive solution to an offending household, ask yourself what your ultimate goal is, revenge or resolution? Do you want the offending party to suffer for the aggravation they have caused you, or do you just want the parties to stop? It's hard to ask this question without sounding judgmental, so please allow me to follow with the statement that in some cases the aggressive solution is the only option. Some people truly are unreasonable and in rare cases it may be dangerous to approach them in even the friendliest manner. Please use your best judgment. The only point I am trying to make is that you should always include the charm offensive in the options you consider, with the realization that it might be the simplest and most effective option in achieving your goal.



In the Derby itself, participants go from station to station; at each they are tasked with demonstrating (or cleverly improvising) various scoutcraft, wilderness survival, and backwoods engineering skills. Examples are as varied as building a fire in the shortest possible time; identifying plant and animal species; winter rescue techniques; building and testing a catapult; providing first aid under disabling conditions; and even the caber toss (of "Highland Games" fame). Of course, prior to the event, each team must construct a sled or wagon to haul their equipment from station to station. Venture Crew 1083 is a well-seasoned group with plenty of cold-weather experience. They laughed at the cold and had a great time in conditions that

would reduce most people to whimpering, shivering sacks of misery.

In February, the Crew will head to Ski Liberty in Pennsylvania to find some more cold to laugh at, as they slide down steep slopes with slippery boards attached to their feet. Then, in the spring, the High Adventure program will come back out of hibernation, as two—not one, but two—Philmont 2013 crews will undergo their last warm-up hikes in preparation for July's big trip to the mountains and pinyon-juniper forests near Cimarron, New Mexico. Also in the spring, the Philmont 2015 crew will begin their own 2-year training program with their first few "shakedown" hikes. In the next couple of months, if you happen to be on the Appalachian Trail or some other top-notch hiking venue. and bump into a line of green-shirted backpackers, say hello; it might just be a Venture Crew trek!




